

School Lesson

Lesson Scripture: Ezra 9: 5-11, 15

Lesson Aims: To summarize Ezra's reactions to the people's sin; to understand that God's leaders confront sin even if they are alone; and to approach God with a broken and contrite heart.

Background: More than 700 years passed between the leadership of Gideon and Ezra. The Israelites had ups and downs in their relationship with God. Please note that He was always faithful to

them! Priests and prophets were sent to warn the people, but a deep, abiding love for the people. Jesus of course is the for the most part, the warnings were ignored. Eventually,

their sinful ways forced God to bring Judgment. He allowed foreign invaders to capture the land and scatter the people.

Judgment came to Israel, the Northern Kingdom in 722 BC. Judah didn't learn from their brothers, so in 605 BC, the Babylonians seized the land and deported them. Read II Kings 10-17 for Israel's demise, and II Kings 18-25 for Judah. Does their behavior sound familiar? God ordained the priesthood in Exodus as intercessors for the people. They identified with the people, offered sacrifices to and petitioned God on their behalf: The priests were to have



Program to examine life of Schweitzer

Wake Forest University will host a symposium, "Revisiting the Legacy of Albert Schweitzer: Reverence for Life in a Global Context," from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Sept. 22 in Wait Chapel.

The event, sponsored by Department Philosophy and the School of Divinity, is free and open to

the public. Predrag Cicoyacki, pro

fessor of philosophy College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass., and an internationally known authority



Schweitzer's life thought, will deliver the keynote address, "Teaching Reverence for Life. Cicovacki's most recent books include Albert Schweitzer's Ethical Vision: Sourcebook." "Dostoevsky Affirmation of Life."

Albert Schweitzer (1875-1965) was a theologian, philosopher. musician. physician and missionary whose work shaped multiple disciplines throughout the 20th century. His ethic of "Reverence for Life" is an important theme approaching his significant contribution to multiple disciplines.
