Waiting on His Return

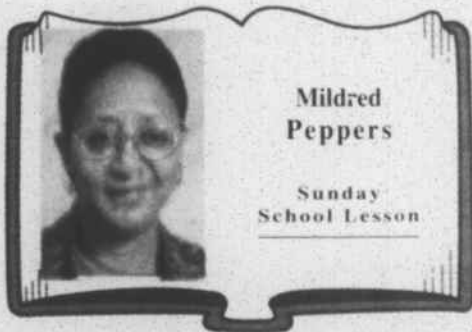
Lesson Scripture: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

Lesson Aims: To understand the meaning of "Day of the Lord;" to recognize that Christ can return anytime - be ready; and to live a life of faith, hope and love.

Background: Paul started the church at Thessalonica. He was there for a short time (three weeks to three months) but his impact was tremendous before being forced to leave. When Timothy reported how well they were doing, Paul was elated and inspired to write this epistle of encouragement. The apostle pointed out how important their witness was for non-

believers as well as for each other. While waiting for Jesus' return, each of them had to live in such a way that pleased God.

Realizing that hard times were ahead for the young church, he urged them to encourage each other. In last week's lesson, Paul told them to live holy, practice love, mind their business and be productive. Following those guidelines, the church would gain the respect of those around them. Paul also addressed several issues surrounding the "Day of the Lord." The term originated with

Emerging gospel star Woods releases sophomore disc

DeWayne Woods' second CD was released last month.

The Quiet Water Entertainment/Verity Gospel Music Group CD release "My Life's Lyric" offers a mixture of comforting ballads, funky up-tempo tunes, and lively praise and worship songs. It is, according to Woods, a more mature and sophisticated album.

"I've grown a lot since I recorded my last CD, and the songs on this project reflect that," says Woods. "'My Life's Lyric' is an album full of testimonies of everything that I've been through. Jeremiah 29:11 is my favorite scripture, and that powerful word is the foundation for this project."

Each track not only represents a different experience and a different aspect of Woods' life, but most of all, each song expresses another trait of God's awesome character. With producers including P.J. Morton, Aaron Lindsey, and Daniel Weatherspoon, the disc includes the debut single "Living on the

Top," a remake of the song made famous by Douglas Miller in 1992. A second single, "I Won't Be Afraid," will be serviced to radio soon.

"I was drawn to 'Living on the Top' because it speaks to what is being taught, even now, in churches about understanding our place in God and our positioning in the Kingdom," says Woods. "'I Won't Be Afraid' shows us the dynamics between fear and faith. We know the scripture that talks about faith being the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen; but fear is the substance of things that we do not hope for, and the evidence of things that we do see."

Donald Lawrence, Woods' mentor and president of Quiet Water Entertainment, says, "We put together a phenomenal group of producers who were able to take DeWayne to another level musically. 'My Life's Lyric' is an amazing album that showcases DeWayne's powerful vocals and his connection with God, and it is also an album that explores DeWayne's wide range as a modern gospel artist."

CommUNITY 2010 coming to Clemmons this coming Sunday

In lieu of their morning services on Sunday, July 4, Agape Faith Church, Center Grove Baptist Church and River Oaks Community Church will join together at the West Forsyth High School Football Stadium for CommUNITY 2010 at 10 a.m.

The event is being billed as a first of its kind event for this area, mainly because the three churches are only a few short miles away from one another and are all different denominations. The purpose of the event, say organizers, is to assist with bringing the community together while encouraging one another to find the common things that bind us, rather than looking for differences that separate us.

CommUNITY 2010 promises something for the entire family. In addition to a joint message of encouragement presented by all three churches, there will be performances by a mass choir and a joint band.

Clemmons Mayor John Bost joined officials from the churches and West Forsyth on Tuesday to announce CommUNITY 2010, which is free and open to the general public.
