Stafford, the daughter of Dickie and Debbie Stafford of Winston-Salem, led groups in creating a fabric bereavement heart for grieving parents in memory of losing a child in early pregnancy. She also organized a collection of clothing and toiletry items that were donated to Forsyth Medical Center.

Hill, the daughter of Rodney and Diane Hill of Kernersville and member of Troop 40257, held self-defense classes at R. J. Reynolds High School last spring. The classes centered on helping improve the confidence and awareness of students at R. J. Reynolds. Students were taught methods of defending themselves when confronted in crowded or secluded areas. The classes helped students realize that when confronted with a potentially dangerous situation it is better to move out of harm's way.


Hague inducted into honor society

mately 30,000 students, faculty, professional staff and alumni to be initiated into Phi Kappa Phi each year.


Founded in 1897 at the University of Maine, Phi Kappa Phi is the nation's oldest, largest and most selective all-
