Crisis Control Ministry's Breaking the Cycle program is now accepting applications for the summer session. Classes meet weekly for two hours from June 17 -Aug. 19.

N.C.'s top assistant principal goes to Washington

Wiley Middle School Assistant Principal Leigh Walters recently traveled to Washington, D.C. to be honored as the North Carolina Assistant Principal of the Year as part of events honoring national and state assistant principals of the year from across the nation. The D.C. program was spon-sored by the National Association of Secondary Principals School (NASSP) and Virco, Inc.

During her time in D.C., Walters spent a day on Capitol Hill discussing education issues with North Carolina legislators, including U.S. Sen. Richard Burr and his legislative assistant Christopher Toppings, U.S. Sen. Kay Hagan and her education policy advisor Ashely Eden and U.S. Rep. Virginia Foxx's legislative correspondent Meghan Stringer.

The topics discussed included reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title I, parent accountability and raising the dropout age to 18. To thank them for their time, Walters presented lawmakers with the Arbinger Institute's "The Anatomy of Peace.'

Walters also heard from U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan, who spoke during the assistant principals' forum and black-tie awards gala. Each assistant principal was invited on stage to receive his or her award and be formally recognized for their achieve-

"There are no great schools without great teams, without great principals, and without great assistant principals," Duncan said. "As a parent, thank you so much. If we could find ways to clone you guys, clone your expertise... (we'd) have a chance to take education to an entirely different level in this country."

As part of the threeday forum, Walters also took advantage of numerous professional development opportunities, a roundtable discussion with members from the U.S. Department Education on how to allocate funds to develop, attract and retain more effective leaders in a highneeds school and discussions of best practices with assistant principals from around the nation.

This event occurred during National Assistant Principals Week, which was formally declared by a Senate Resolution to be March 31-April 4.


