Lesson: Jesus was buried late Friday afternoon by Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus in accordance with Jewish law requiring burial of corpses before the Sabbath. After the Sabbath Mary Magdalene, Salome, and Mary the mother of James bought spices to anoint Jesus' body. Going very early Sunday morning

while it was still dark, the women wonder how they will have the stone blocking the tomb's entrance removed. But finding the tomb open, the women enter and encounter a man in white apparel who tells them that Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified and had been dead was no longer dead but resurrected. Because He had broken the grip of death, He was no longer in the sepulcher (see Mark8:31; 9:9, 31:10:34).

The women were also

invited by the angel to examine the spot where Jesus had been placed. They found the burial clothes undisturbed because Jesus had passed through them. Note here also that the sepulcher was not opened to let Jesus out, but to let the women in. The angel then tells the women not to be frightened, but to go and tell the disciples and Peter that Jesus is going ahead to meet them in Galilee. The women leave and don't

speak to anyone until they are united with the disciples who don't believe them. Peter however, had to see for himself and went to the sepulchre (Luke 24:11-12).

"There is a great deal of historical evidence for Jesus' resurrection. Ours is the only religion that includes a risen savior; we can fully trust in Him." (Union Gospel Press, Keith E. Eggert)

For Your Consideration: What might have been the

purpose of having an angel greet the women rather than the risen Jesus Himself? Why were the women to direct the disciples to Galilee when Jesus would appear to them that very night in Jerusalem?

Life's Application: As Christians we need to recognize the importance of affirming that Jesus' resurrection actually took place. But how do we do it? We do so by cultivating a personal relationship with the risen Lord in our daily life.
