Walkertown looked to answer immediately on their first drive. They drove the ball all the way inside of the 10 yard line of Mt. Airy but a brought it back.



fumbled while scrambling, giving possession back to the Wolfpack. Unfortunately for the Granite Bears, their starting quarterback was injured on the play and was unable to return. That play swung the momentum in favor of the Wolfpack for the remainder of the game.
