The Forsyth County Court convened in the courthouse yesterday morning for a week's term with Judge H. R. Starbuck presiding. The jury empaneled for the week is as follows: Messrs. G. M. Martin, W. G. Hill, W. H. Vermillion, Ed. B. Moore, F. C. Joyce, James W. Teague, W. H. Yarborough, Alfred Shore, J. M. Greenfield, John Thompson, G. Clayton and Thomas E. Kapp.

The evidence in the case of Johnny Clancy against C. S. Lee and the City of Winston-Salem was completed yesterday afternoon before court adjourned and the argument will be taken up this morning. A compromise was reached in the case of Nellie Hairston, by her next friend, W. P. Hairston, against the Winston-Salem Southbound Railway Company, in which the plaintiff recovers from the defendant the sum of \$12,000.

CHANGES IN THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL MARRIAGE CEREMONY RECOMMENDED IN A MINORITY REPORT

(By The Associated Press.) St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 16.—Elimination of the word "obey" in the marriage service was recommended in a minority report of the joint commission on common prayer submitted to the house of deputies of the Protestant Episcopal general convention here today. The house of deputies referred back to the commission all proposed changes in the marriage ceremony, in the catechism, and in the institution of clergyman, and these questions cannot come before the general convention again for three years. The minority report recommended that the present injunction beginning "wilt thou obey him and serve him," be changed to "wilt thou love him, comfort him, honor and keep him, in sickness and in health, and forsaking all others, keep these only unto him so long as ye shall live."

STEPS TO ELIMINATE CHOLERA

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) Tokio, Oct. 16.—The gradual increase of cases of cholera in Japan has caused the government to order a rigorous quarantine in all Japanese ports and harbors. It will be especially effective against all steamers and other craft coming from Nagasaki or touching Nagasaki where the epidemic is chiefly current. There have been 317 cases in Nagasaki with 152 deaths. There are several cases in the cities of Yokohama, Kobe and Osaka, and one at Omoro, near Tokio. No cases have been reported in Tokio itself.
