While it is conceded that Rubens was one of the most famous of artists, it is said that he was even more successful as a diplomat, having been one of the greatest of court favorites and court painters.

It is given to Turner that he was the first artist successfully to put moonlight into painting.

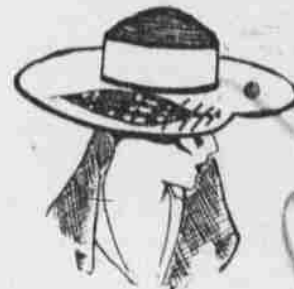
