INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Twenty-three Protestant churches here attended by white congregations reported in a survey that they would not accept members of other races at services.

The churches replied to a questionnaire distributed by a race relations committee acting for the Indianapolis Church Federation in cooperation with the National Council of Churches. However, 54 churches said they would accept other races. Of these, 19 were Negro churches.

containers of non-tax paid whiskey beneath a clever trap-door in the bedroom floor.

UNDER FLOOR

Sheriff Salmon described how he rolled back a wool rug to find a trap door which opened to reveal the liquor cache. He said the whiskey rested on the ground a few feet below the floor and was hidden from sight in all directions since the house is securely underplanned with brick.

Constable W. B. Castleberry testified that officers had received many complaints over a period of years about liquor sales at Mrs. Goins' but were unable to find whiskey when the place was searched previously.

Attorneys for the women argued it was a first offense, and cited the defendant's arthritic condition. They said she was needed at home to care for her 15-year-old high school daughter. The court was told Mrs. Goins and her husband have been separated for many years. She received the house and five acres of land in the separation agreement. They had six children, the majority of them now married.

In another case, the court found Zach McDougald, well known Negro merchant of Shattown, guilty of receiving stolen goods. Judgment was suspended on payment of costs. Benjamin Bailey, teen-age Negro boy in jail awaiting trial on 15 burglary counts, testified he sold eight cartons of cigarettes stolen from the Green-Heights Grill in Lillington to McDougald for nine dollars.

HOT CIGS

Bailey quoted McDougald as asking if the cigarettes were "hot" and the youth said he replied, "Well, they are warm."

Three defendants entered pleas of guilty to driving drunk. They included Peter Joseph Rosheger, 22, Ft. Bragg; John R. Davis, 24, Ft. Bragg; and Miss Ida Parrish, 18, Fayetteville. All paid \$100 fines and Rosheger was given a 30-day suspended jail sentence.

Miss Parrish was booked on three counts, public drunkenness, resisting arrest and operating a car without an operator's license. She went to the court's verdict, which first included a suspended 30-day sentence, later ordered stricken from the record. Cpl. Roy Williamson said he arrested Miss Parrish in company of a young soldier on highway 217 near Erwin. The officer said both were intoxicated.

Careless and reckless drivers of various types were fined \$25 and costs. In this group were Cpl. Roy J. Hedgepeth, found guilty of speeding and violating stop signs in Angier. He was ordered not to drive in Harnett County on his furlough. Felton Walker, 24, Linden, Route 1, was found guilty of speeding.

Victor O'Neil Dancy, was found guilty of careless and reckless driving as result of an accident. Clarence E. Graham, 39, Negro truck driver for Cannady Trucking Company, Lillington, was found guilty of speeding a heavy truck, although he claimed the truck speedometers are not correct. Judgment was suspended on payment of \$10 fine and costs and on condition he not speed on the highway.

In another case arising out of traffic violations, Hinton L. Clayton, 40 of Ponzer in Hyde County, was taxed with costs for failure to yield right-of-way at the crossroads road of Lillington. Robert Porter, Erwin radio announcer, who was the prosecuting witness in a trespass case, entered plea of guilty to operating with expired license plates. He was taxed the costs. Burnett London Chalmers entered a plea of guilty to operating a car after the license revoked; prayer for judgment was continued.

defective brakes caused his car to veer to the left and go into a tailspin, but admitted previous convictions for speeding. "We'll give the benefit of the doubt," said Judge Lee.

Mamie Morris entered a plea of guilty to assault; prayer for judgment was continued on condition she not molest the prosecuting witness, Margie Ree Lee.

Jack Melvin, picked up along the highway by officers and charged with public drunkenness, was discharged and the costs ordered remitted when it was found he was an ill man. He was returned to relatives in Fayetteville.

Jack Stewart and Bettie Faircloth, who traded blows with a can of motor oil, had filed cross

complaints of assault. Solicitor Nell from recommended they dismiss the charges after Stewart entered a plea of simple trespass on the Faircloth property. Both were taxed the costs.

DROP CHARGES

Willie Shutman, Willie Shipman and H. Catts, all charged with assault, had the case not pressed with leave, due to the absence of the prosecuting witness Ouits, who claimed in the warrant he was cut with a pocket knife on February 9.

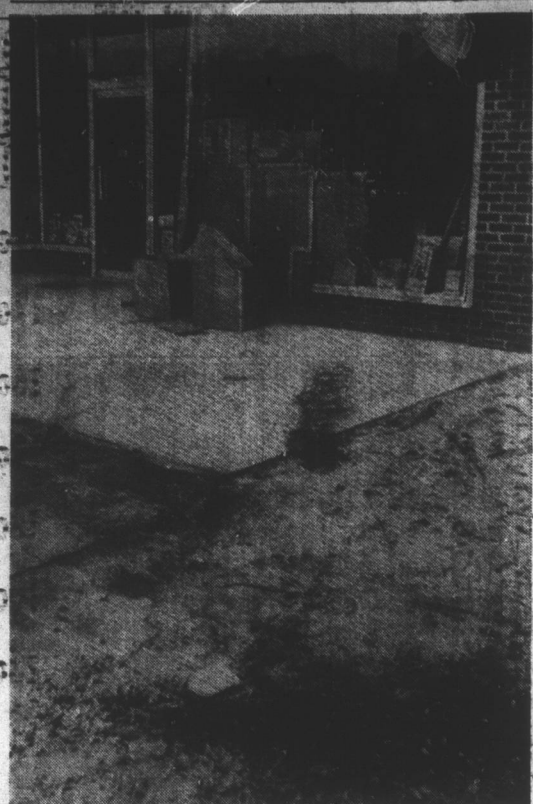

WASHINGTON (AP) — Executive agencies of the federal government hired 15,000 workers in January, the Civil Service Commission reported today.

8TH ARMY HQ., Korea (AP) — Communist troops attacked the Allied lines south of the Panmunjom truce negotiation area but were beaten off after a 30-minute battle at closer range.

BEDFORD, Va. (AP) — Sen. Harry F. Byrd has predicted that the name of the Blue Ridge Parkway will remain unchanged.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Assistant Attorney General James M. McInery disclosed today that the Justice Department is conducting "an extensive investigation" of Far Eastern expert Owen Lattimore.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Civil Aeronautics Board sources said today that they hoped airlines will bring their coach fares in line with CAB policy before any actual air coach flights are cancelled.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Russian Aeronautical progress disclosed in the Korean war has forced "drastic" revision of performance goals for U.S. combat planes now in design stages, it was revealed today.

OTTAWA, Ont. (AP) — Toronto University Chancellor Vincent Massey was installed today as Canada's first native born governor-general and said he would "cherish and preserve" the traditions of his office.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman said today that Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D-Wyo may try to get the Senate to reconsider its action in sending the Alaskan statehood bill back to committee.

DETROIT (AP) — A top official of the world's largest local union at Ford Motor Company shouted "it's a damned lie" when a Communist Party membership card bearing his name was introduced at the House Un-American Activities Committee hearing today. William R. Hood, recording secretary of powerful Local 600 of the CIO United Auto Workers, rose from his seat to shout his denial that card No. 68126 was issued to him.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman told a news conference today that he will make no announcement of his political plans during his forthcoming visit to Key West, Fla., which is expected to last until March 28.
