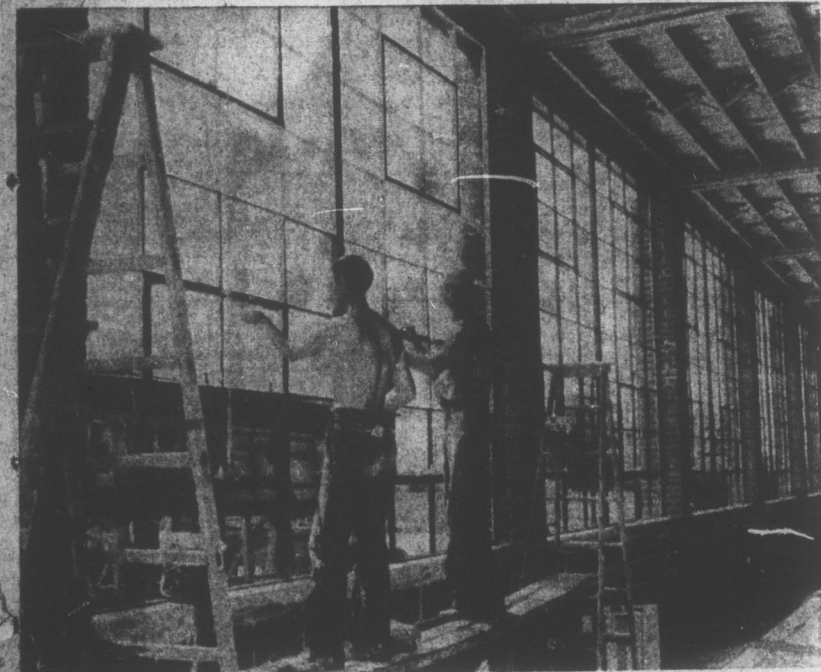

Pepper Plant Now Being Completed

While finishing touches were being put on a modern factory building in Dunn for the H. P. Cannon and Son cannery, farmers of the area were busy this week setting pepper plants which they hope will produce a crop to be processed in the factory this summer.

Roy V. Tew Jr., field representative for the large cannery headquarters at Bridgefield, Delaware, stated this week that the plants have been distributed to local farmers.

More than a million plants, three fourths of which were grown locally, have been sold to farmers who have contracted to furnish peppers for the plant. Contracts have been signed for approximately 500 acres of peppers, Tew pointed out this week as the plants went out.

Explaining the profit in raising peppers, Tew said that a good acre should produce around 300 baskets of ripe peppers. Sales prices this year will range between eighty-five and eighty-eight cents, it has been estimated.

"A good acre should produce more than an acre of cotton with approximately the same work," Tew states.

Harnett County's Farm Agent Cliff Ammons has urged farmers to plant peppers to use land which previously was planted in cotton. Acreage on cotton was cut this year by a federal order.

Peppers planted now should begin to produce around the middle of July, officials of the local company say. With proper care, the picking season will last from three to four months.

The local branch of Cannon Canneries, established in Delaware in 1881, was made possible through the local Chamber of Commerce. (Continued On Page Two)

Big 3, Reds Agree On Peace Meeting

GENEVA (AP) — The Western Big Three and the Soviet bloc agreed in principle today on a nine-member Indo-China peace conference.

Informed Western sources said Russia apparently dropped an earlier demand that India be included. Principals in the conference would be the United States, Britain, France, the Soviet Union, Red China, the three Associated States of Indochina and representatives of the Indochinese Communist rebels.

The agreement was reached at a lunch table conference between Britain's Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and Red China's Premier and Foreign Minister Chou En-lai.

SUBJECT TO APPROVAL It still is subject to final approval by the other participants. An official announcement may be made shortly, informed Western sources said. (Continued On Page Five)

Love Potion Slayer Sobs In Jail Cell

LONDON (AP) — A sobbing 44-year-old office manager who whispered, "Oh Betty, I did not kill you" was charged with manslaughter today in the death of a pretty typist who ate sweets containing a fatal dosage of a "love drug."

Two attractive typists died after eating the confection in the office of Arthur Ford, father of two children, who staged a hysterical scene when charged at a police station. Detective Supt. John Jameson said: "I cautioned him that anything he said might be used in evidence against him, and he replied 'Dear God, what an awful thing I have done.'"

When Ford actually was charged, Jameson said, "He became distressed and on the way back to the detention room kept sobbing 'Oh Betty, I did not kill you.'"

By custom, Ford was charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of only one of the two girls. June Malins, 19-year-old bathing beauty queen, and Betty Grant, 27, died after eating a confection called coconut ice served in the office of Ford, office manager of a drug firm. The confection was found sprinkled with cantharidic acid, a drug made of dried beetles and popularly regarded as a sexual stimulant.

Ford also collapsed from eating the same confection Monday but yesterday left the hospital where his wife sat by his bedside during his recovery. Detectives took him weeping to the police station.

McCarthy Staff Tells How Photo Came Into Being

WASHINGTON (AP) — A member of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's staff took responsibility today for a "doctored" photograph of Pvt. G. David Schine and Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens to Senate investigators.

The witness was James N. Juliano who was put under questioning at the Army-McCarthy hearings after the Wisconsin senator announced he was the one person who could best tell the story of what happened to the famous photograph.

Juliano said two sets of photographs were made at his request from a print supplied by Schine. One showed Schine, Stevens, and Col. Jack T. Bradley.

The other showed only Schine and Stevens. Juliano said he delivered Ray H. Jenkins "because I thought that was the one you wanted."

Juliano testified that when the photographs were delivered, he had mounted on hard white paper the (Continued on Page Eight)

Town Will Collect Recreation Funds

Dunn's City Council voted last night to serve as a collecting agent for the local Recreation Commission and accept funds from volunteer assessments on the water meters of Dunn.

Justice, vice president of the Commission, asked Council to approve of accepting funds from persons willing to have fifty cents added to their monthly water bills, and add it to the Recreation Commission's funds.

Justice said that cards will be sent out soon asking the owner of each water meter to allow Dunn to add fifty cents each month to their bill for Recreation. The plan was devised after the Recreation fund tax was defeated in a special election in March of this year.
