Carter, whose baccalaureate degree was earned at Hampton Institute, received the master of arts degree from New York University. Having done further study at the Catholic University of America, he has studied at the Vienna Symposium and the Aspen Choral Institute.

.Carter is listed in "Outstanding Young Men of America, 1967," and "Personalities of the South, "1969 and 1970. In 1965 he recieved a MacLellan Foundation Fellowship. The Ford Foundation Advanced Study Fellowship was awarded in 1970-71. Carter is also listed in the "World Who's Who of Musicians.'

.. He is a member of the American Choral Directors Association, National Association of Negro Musicians, Music Educators National Conference, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

.Carter, who is an internationally known director, has been called by a New York critic a "spirited and dynamic conductor with consummate control over his forces. He is a masterful conductor.......'


