**Virginia State Moves Into First**

**Place Tie With Winston-Salem State**

 HAMPTON, VA.—As the CIAA football season passes the mid point, Winston-Salem continues in a first place tie in the conference standings as they downed Livingstone 17-

9. Cornelius Washington, who leads the conference in interceptions, had two interceptions, 22 tackles, recovered a fumble and knocked down a pass to lead the Rams defense. Offensive tackle Gary Radford continually opened holes in the line for the offense.

On a rainy night and a muddy field Winston-Salem rushed for 227 yards and held Livingstone to only 59. Neither team was able to score in the first quarter but Livingstone scored first in the second period on a field goal and did not score again until late in the fourth quarter. Winston-Salem's first score came after recovering a fumble in the second quarter. They scored again before the end of the second quarter and lead at the half, 14-3.

Virginia State unleashed George Leonard, who rushed 16 times for 195 yards and scored three touchdowns as the Trojans blitzed Shaw 52-6. Virginia State remains undefeated in conference play and is tied for the lead with Winston-Salem. The Trojans accumulated 444 yards total offense and held Shaw to 207. Linwood Hardy intercepted three passes, one for 34 yards and a touchdown and another for 79 yards which set up another score. Freshman running back Terry Huston carried the ball 10 times for 50 yards and scored one touchdown.

CIAA offensive leader Virginia Union continued to display a high powered offense and a stingy defense as they humbled winless Elizabeth City 21-6. Sophomore flanker Malcolm Barnwell scored Union's first two touchdowns, one on a 11 yard run and another on a 47 yard pass reception. Union's other scores came when defensive end Plummer Bullock recovered a midair fumble and galloped 38 yards for the score. Bullock also had 5 tackles, one quarterback

sack and recovered two fumbles. Barnwell accumulated a total of 111 yards total offense with 58 rushing and 53 on pass receptions.

Reggie Midget caught two passes for a total of 84 yards that set up two touchdowns as Hampton defeated Bowie State 27-7. Running back Philander Carter took a kickoff in the third quarter and raced 87 yards for one of Hampton's scores. Hampton was penalized 188 yards and Bowie State had 114 yards called in penalties. Five of Hampton's penalties were for roughing the kicker.

Norfolk State threw four interceptions in the first half and North Carolina A&T turned two into scores as they spoiled the Spartans homecoming before 20,000 fans. Norfolk State was unable to score until 8:54 was left in the fourth quarter. The Spartans scored one more time and the final score was A&T 21 Norfolk State 14.

Larue Harrington, last week's CIAA rushing leader

was held to just 55 yards rushing in 16 attempts.

Ernest "Warhorse" Williams returned to the Johnson C. Smith lineup after missing two games, but Johnson C. Smith was still unable to get their offense in gear as they were downed by NCAA Division II leaders, South Carolina State, 48-6. The Golden Bulls were only able to gain 90 yards rushing. South Carolina State, running the veer, rushed for 417 yards and had 14 first downs. Johnson C. Smith hit

on only 3 of 26 pass attempts.

Fayetteville State, who was idle last weekend, came close to shutting out St. Paul's 24-2. After a 10-0 half-time lead the Broncos came back to score in each of the second half periods. Chris Barfield was the Broncos leading rusher with 64 yards. This game was the Schlitz Game of the Week. Watches were won by Fayetteville State's offensive lineman, Burnis Travis for his outstanding play and by Ricky Furline, the defensive line-

**Littlejohn Captures Third Place In City Meet**

Donald Littlejohn, the stylish playing school teacher who has been playing great golf this season, finished third in the City Amateur golf tournament here last week.

The Cochrane Junior High head football coach shot 76-70 at Raintree Country Club's South course Friday and Saturday and wound up with a 73 at Pawtucket Golf Club Sunday to finish behind David Kiser, the winner, and Gabe Hill, who came in second.

"I'm surprised that I played well enough to finish as high as I did," Littlejohn said Monday morning. "I have experienced a slump that has

my game somewhat below par. I haven't played lately." He, however, played well enough in the city's most prestigious golf meet to win a gift certificate and he will not have to qualify for future City Amateur Golf tournaments.

A graduate of Johnson C. Smith University, Littlejohn has won two tournaments this year and has placed no lower than third in four others. He paired with Haywood Stevenson to win the popular Par Buster 4-Ball Tournament and he was the best golfer in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School Teachers Tournament.

"I feel that my game hasn't peaked," the former JCSU quarterback said. "I believe I should be playing much better. It's something I'll have to work on."

The other black golfers who played well in the city meet were Tippy Glover, Haywood Stevenson, Andre Springs, Gardner Brown and Harry Gray.

Glover, an official at Cedarwood Golf Course, shot 230 with rounds of 79, 75, 76, to finish 10th in the championship flight. Stevenson placed fourth in the second flight with 237, having shot 81-79-77.

Johnson C. Smith University's No. 1 player, Harry Gary,

came in ninth with rounds of 79-81-81 for a 54-hole total of 241. Springs carded 239, with rounds of 80-83-76, to tie for third place with Ted Graham Jr. and Gardner Brown, a JCSU player, finished fifth in the fourth flight with 254. Brown posted an 83 Friday, followed with an 87 Saturday and finished with an 84 Sunday afternoon.
