A Census Bureau report reveals that between March 1975 and March 1977, 147,000 blacks moved out of the Northeast with more than two-thirds of them - 104,000 - moved to the South. During the same period, black migration out of the South was considerably less than in previous comparative periods.

Charlotte voters may be asked through a referendum in September to approve a \$47-million bond issue to underwrite part of a \$59-million passenger terminal and air cargo complex at Douglas Municipal. The bond issue would be paid off from airport revenues over the next 25 years. The other \$12-million would be paid with revenues from air cargo lease and federal grants.

The Department of Labor reports that unemployment declined to 6.1 percent in February. This represents the fourth consecutive month that the jobless rate has fallen, and more significantly, the lowest unemployment level in 3.3 years.

Equally significant is the fact that the decline reflects job gains for blacks whose unemployment declined to 11.8 percent, down from 12.7 percent in January. The data, the Department of Labor believes, indicated that government efforts to find more jobs for minorities might be paying off.

In an apparent effort to ease international pressure and to appease South Africa's black community, the government released from prison on Friday, March 10 newspaper editor Percy Qoboza and nine other black leaders. The 10 leaders had been held without charges since a so-called massive security crackdown last October 19.

Small businesses are not ex-

pected to do as well as big businesses under President Carter's tax plan, according to the Senate Small Business Committee. Its analysis concludes the firms with taxable income exceeding \$100 million a year will gain 60 percent of the benefits of the President's tax cut. On the other hand, companies with taxable income under \$50,000 will get only four percent.
