Timothy Thomas Fortune,

outstanding printer and journalist, joined the New York Age in 1892 and developed it into a major voice for blacks throughout America. Previously, he had worked for the New York Evening Sun both as a printer and a journalist. And had also been part owner of several black weeklies, including the Rumor, the Globe, and the New York Freeman. After selling the Age to Fred R. Moore in 1905, he joined the staff of Booker T. Washington's Natinal Business League at Tuskegee where he remained until his death in 1928. He was born in Mari-

anna, Fla., in 1856. John Mitchell, Jr. was editor-publisher of the Richmond Planet which he took over in 1884 and made into a powerful force in the southeastern part of the United States. Although threatened many times, he crusaded vigorously against lynching. He was vice president of the National Black

Council in 1888. His paper merged with the Richmond born near Richmond in 1863.

John H. Murphy, Sr., bought a Sunday School journal with a \$200 loan from his wife in 1892 and converted it into the Baltimore Afro-American which has developed a chain that dominates the Atlantic Seaboard from New Jersey to the Carolinas. Even during his lifetime, the Afro became the major black newspaper east of the Applachain and had a staff of 138. He was born a slave in 1840 and died in 1922.

Christopher J. Perry, Sr., created the oldest created the continously published commercial black newspaper in America, the Philadelphia Tribune, which he founded in 1884 and served as its editor-publisher until his death in 1921, the 94-year-old Tribune continues
