### Youth Seminar

Judy Elaine Holloway, of Charlotte, was among approximately 120 high school students from throughout North Carolina who participated in the Seventh Annual Youth Seminar on Law, Leadership and Government. The seminar took place in Chapel Hill on July 27 - August 1.

The seminar, which was co-sponsored by the North Carolina Institute of Government in Chapel Hill and the State Youth Council (a component of the N.C. Department of Administration's Youth Involvement Office), was designed to give young people opportunities to learn more about government and how to develop their own leadership skills.

The participants attended a number of workshops and panel discussions on justice and youth rights, news media, community organizing and government. At the end of the week-long session, the students received certificates for their participation during a luncheon featuring an address by Howard Lee, secretary of the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development.

During the week, the students heard other state officials including Attorney General Rufus Edmisten; Elizabeth Koonix, assistant superintendent of the Department of Public Instruction; Gary Pearce, the Governor's press secretary; Rep. Patricia Hunt; and District Court Judge William Jones of Charlotte.

Holloway, a recent graduate from Coulwood Junior High School, was clarinetist in the South Central All-State Clinic Band, and was voted as the outstanding clarinetist of 1979-80. She was also a member of the Executive Student Council, the band, chorus, orchestra and volleyball team.

A member of the Student Advisory Committee, Holloway received certificates of merit for services to the school in math, French, volleyball, and the orchestra.
