INTRODUCTION

A group of rich and fashionable ladies once made arrangements to visit a coal mine. When they arrived for the tour, one of the women was wearing an expensive white dress. The guide spoke to her, suggesting it might not be a good idea to wear such a dress into the mine. The woman responded quite haughtily to the man's suggestion: "My good man, I will year what I choose without any advice from you. You can't prevent me from wearing it down there if I hoose to." "No, malam," replied the guide. "I can't prevent you from wearing that white dress in, but can assure you that there are many things down there to prevent your wearing t back out."

Living the Christian life is quite like that. Some argue that a Christian has the right to go any place he wants and in a sense that is true. But there are some places that a Christian cannot go without running the risk of moral contamination. James' warning is still valid. "Friendship of the world is enmity with God."

In verses 1-3 James has established that their strife came because of their selfish desires. Now he turns to sharp rebuke and admonition.

(James 4:4-6) Yeadulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity #th God? Whosoever therefore will be a ffend of the world is the enemy of God.

The masculine erm adulterers is not found in the bette manuscripts, only the feminine adultress. James uses a figure that his Jewish reders would understand. In the Old Testament God's relationship to In the Old Testament God's relationship to the Israelites was sometimes depicted as a marriage. Israel' unfaithful to God was then described asadultery. Jehovah God is a jealous God who will tolerate no rivals. The world, in the case not the physical world but the evil, sensual aspects of the world, represent the false lover who is God's rival for or affections. Jesus stated the situation quie clearly: "No man can serve two mastes," (Matt. 6:14).

"Do ye think that the Scripture saith in vain. The Spirit hat dwelleth in us lusteth to envy? But he girth more grace. Wherefore he saith God resteth the proud, but giveth race unto the umble.

James seems o be asking, does the spirit that God place in you as you became united with Chist urge you to seek the things of this world? Does the spirit impel you to fight aid lust and kill as you are doing? The implied answer is a definite "no!"

In the words of verses 6, James is quoting from Proverbs3:34, a Greek translation of the Old Testanent with which his readers would be familiar. Some, however, in their pride refuse traccept this grace. Those who arrogantly opose Him find Him unyielding, for God vill not accept the haughty. Only those wih a contrite heart can come to Him. "The acrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not lespise," Psalms 51:17.

While God resists the proud, He gives grace that s, He shows favor, to the humble. The humble receive this favor because the feel their need and place themselves a a position to receive God's blessings.

I read of man who about once a month took a bus to the downtown shopping area of a large city He would spend the day visiting several deartment stores but he never bought anthing. Finally someone asked him about his unusual practice."Well," he said, "I like to visit all the stores and see all the things that I am perfectly happy without.'

We may be tempted to laugh at such behavior; but before we do, we ought to examine our own thinking and ask why we deem suci behavior eccentric. It may be that in terms of God's standards, as expressed in the fourth chapter of James, we are the eccentric.

On occasion our society has been called the "acquisitive society." Modern advertis-ing is geared to produce in us an obn to acquire things. We fill our homes with labor-saving devices and then have to spend the extra time we saved working to pay for them. We have closets full of clothes that we couldn't wear out in a lifetime, but the advertisers convince us that we cannot wear anything but the latest fashions. They have made status symbols of alligators on our sweaters and even on our socks.

The disturbing thing about all this is that Christians have fallen victim to this acquisi-tion fever just like everyone else. Indeed, if this were the only basis for judging, we might be hard pressed to distinguish between a Christian and a non-Christian.
