do not to go out and say something to him."

Then on another occasion Miss Creola had answered the door of her employees. Upon greeting Eisenhower who said "Is the man of the house available?" she promptly responded "Good evening to you too General Eisenhower!

Miss Creola is a lady of spunk. She is one extremely opposed to hypocrisy and lying. "In some cases parents may drive their children away from home by lying about what they do and by being hypocritical." If one smokes and drinks behind closed doors, but talks negatively about others wno smoke and drink in public; the first is just as bad or worse than the latter, Miss Creole explained.

Miss Creola advises youth to be the best. "Anything you go into give it all you have. Go as far as you can go. Don't ever feel that
