## Home Im Loans Available DEOXIGINATION

A limited number of home improvement loans at below-market interest, nine percent, are now avilable in older Charlotte neighborhoods for qualified moderateincome homeowners. The
Home Improvement Loan
Program (HILP) is operated by the City Community Development Department, in cooperation with the North Carolina
Housing Finance Agency and the Southeastern
Savings & Loan Company.
To qualify, homes must be in specified areas, primarily in the central core, northern and western

areas and a few sections in south Charlotte. Home-owners must meet income guidelines. For exemple owners must meet income guidelines. For example, annual income for a family of two to four persons may not exceed \$32,000. The income limit is necessary to conserve limited loan funds for families who may not be able to afford conventional interest rates for home improvement loans.

Loan amounts range.

Loan amounts range from \$5,000 to \$15,000. Funds may be used for improvements such as roof and foundation repairs, electrical and plumbing improvements. improvements, energy

saving improvements, repairs to meet housing code standards and structural additionals an alterations to alleviate overcrowding.
