"But something always hap-pened to turn things around when things looked bleakest," he points out. "It so happened that at that time a friend called and told me of an opportunity with Hertz Corpor-ation. I put a deal together, bor-rowed \$30,000 from SBA and I was off and running again," Leatherman

Is a little luck needed by entre-preneurs? "Luck plays in to some degree," Leatherman admits, "But you have to have the basic know-ledge and tools to do the job. If you have luck it helps. But if you're unlucky you just have to try harder."

Not everyone can be an entre-preneur. Leatherman argues. "It takes a special kind of personality: a person who believes in self, does not give up easy and one who will take calculated risks."


calculated risks."
