his second term.

his second term. One of three at-large Republican candidates, Vinroot describes him-self as a "middle-of-the-roader" who is "willing to be educated" on the issues and who has provided "even-tempered judgment" to a broad range of concerns during his first two years on the Council.

first two years on the Council. Vinroot is proud of the fact that this City Council has worked well together. When there have been dis-agreements, there have been no "potshots," he says. The present Council, he adds, is a good balance of sensitive, thoughtful members and "some like me who want to get on with the" on with it."

The candidate believes the bigg issue to face the new Council will be one of priorities: "how we will cope with the loss of funds from revenue sharing." The City, he says, will be forced to either find alternate sources of income (such as some form of taxation) or cut back on services. Vinroot foresees the Council strug-gling "long and hard" over this

Among specific areas he thinks are of particular importance: public housing, public private devel-

vinces programs. Vincot believes Council some-times gets too bogged down in the details of running the City. Defer-ring some of these details to the City Manager and staff would provide Manager and staff would provide Council with more time to look at

long-range planning and goal-setting, he maintains. During his first two years, the Council member has served on committees for transportation, plan-ning and public works, joint capi-tal needs, and planning lialson with the County.

A native Charlottean who has lived here all his life "except for the Army and law school," is a partner in the law firm, Robinson, Brad-shaw and Hinson, P.A. He is in-volved in numerous community ac-tivites, serving on the boards of directors of the YMCA, Spirit Square, and the Mint Museum. A Morehead Scholarship recipient at UNC-Chapel Hill, Vinroot is on the board of his alma mater's General Alumni Association, is vice chair-man of the university's Board of Visitors, and is a member of the Central Selection Committee of the Morehead Scholarship Program.

He and his wife, Judy, have three children, Rich, 16, Laura, 13, and Katy, eight. Vinroot is a ruling elder in Myers Park Presbyterian Church and a senior high Sunday School trascher teacher.

bang later this fall, but details are still being finalized.
