"We're still a very young sport – we'll turn 50 next season," he said. "It's just not easy to grow up and choose racing regardless of skin color. It's easier for a dad to pick up a bat or glove for his kids than for him to buy a go-cart."

'Auto racing's best-known blacks are drivers: Wendell Scott was the first African American to win a NASCAR race and Willy T. Ribbs was the first to drive in the Indianapolis 500, the world's most prestigious race. Today, African Americans are joining the ownership ranks. Former NBA star Brad Daugherty has a team on the Craftsman Truck Series, NASCAR's newest division. NBC basketball analyst and basketball hall of famer Julius Erving plans to start a Winston Cup team next season with former pro football player Joe Washington. The key to attracting new fans - including African Americans - is having recognizable personalities in the sport, Triplett said.

"We're a name-recognizable society," he said. "Name recognition helps accelerate the process."

But opportunities are available in areas other than ownership. At Charlotte Motor Speedway during preparations for the Coca-Cola 600, blacks work as firefighters and pit crew members. And there are the technical professionals like Turner, who are responsible for cars that reach speeds up to 200 miles an hour. "There's tremendous opportu-

"There's tremendous opportunity outside the cockpit," Triplett said. "The opportunity for anyone are in areas other than behind the wheel. There are golden opportunities out there."
