Dr. Paige admitted that she was never the smartest in her class, but said that after a teacher indirectly called her stupid, she was motivated to be the best.

The 32-year-old obstetrician and gynecologist said she decided in the 8th grade that she wanted to deliver babies. She said her 12 years of education beyond high school was very rigorous.

"Don't be discouraged by outsiders who tell you that you're not good enough or smart enough," Paige said. "You must have a strong sense of self."

Speaker Sandye Hines said she became a certified fitness instructor because her mother died of a heart attack two years ago. She feels that by being a fitness instructor, she can provide encouragement to individuals and help to save lives. She had the participants do a very energizing exercise routine.

The 150 camp-in volunteers were private citizens. Students were greeted by engineers, doctors, parents, lawyers, teachers, high school and college students and a number of other careers and professions.

Volunteers represented community organizations such as The Charlotte Medical Society, Focus on Leadership, National Coalition of 100 Black Women of Greater Charlotte, Swing Phi Swing Social Fellowship and student community service groups like the Johnson C. Smith University Service Learning Program, the JCSU NOBCChE Student Chapter, the AKA Pearls of Culture and the Class Project 2000 mentoring program.

Marilyn Friday and her daughter, Alison, were one of several mother-daughter teams who

attended the camp-in together. "I had a fantastic student chap-

erone, Chessa Huff, who worked with me and my group," Friday said. "She was cheerful, informative, experienced and a sheer delight to work with. I will especially cherish the opportunity that I had to make these memories with my daughter. She had a great time."

Stephanie Clay, an information technology auditor at Duke Energy, volunteered as both a chaperone and moderator for the camp-in for females.Clay also participated in the camp-in when she was a student.

Student Angele Rodgers said, "One thing that I learned and gained from Camp-in '97 was that I am becoming a more people person. I met new friends as well as had an opportunity of filling myself with knowledge."

Aquinette Bradley said: "I learned that to succeed in life I have to believe in myself, and do what I need to do to achieve my beliefs. Also to follow my dreams and never give up no matter what somebody else says I can't do."
