In the modern-vernacular film, which aired Monday on ABC, Jesus is certainly the Good Guy (OK, the Best Guy), but Judas isn't simply the bad one. History's most famous traitor, in effect, gets plopped down on an analyst's couch and probed, and though he's guilty as sin of betraying Jesus, we're asked to consider him as a complex human being with traces of decency as well as dishonor running through his veins.

Samaritan's Feet is holding a 5-kilometer Life Walk through Uptown Charlotte on April 10 at 9 a.m. The walk will raise finances, collect shoes and bring attention to the plight of impoverished people in Third World countries.

"We demonstrate compassion by washing and equipping their feet with shoes and touching their hearts with the love of God," said Emmanuel Ohonme,

founder of Samaritan's Feet.

Nigerian-born Ohonme's life was changed at the age of 9 when he received his first pair of tennis shoes from what he calls a "Good Samari-

tan" who was visiting his hometown of Lagos. The shoes gave him an opportunity to participate in sports and he eventually earned a full sports scholarship at the University of North

Dakota. Ohonme went on to compete in sports activities in Africa and developed a love for competitive basketball. He was

offered the chance to attend college in America under a full basketball scholarship and later earned an executive position at a leading tech-

Although Ohonme continue to progress in the U.S., he never forgot the plight of African children who still live under the strain of poverty, drug abuse, war, gangs and other criminal activity.

Determined to help impoverished Africans as well as people living in Charlotte, Ohonme left the comfort and security of his executive position to start Samaritan's Feet.

Through the organization, Ohonme return the love he received when he was given shoes to millions. His goal is to "put shoes on 10 million impoverished people, with 10 million pairs of shoes, over the next 10 years," he said.

Teacher suspended over 'The Passion'

WASHINGTON - An elementary school teacher was suspended this week after school officials learned that he showed students excerpts from the movie `The Passion of the Christ.

Ronald Anthony, who teaches at Malcolm X Elementary School, was placed on paid leave while investigators look into the incident, Elfreda Massie, the interim superin-tendent for District of Columbia Public Schools, said Fri-

Massie said Anthony acknowledged showing some of his sixth-grade students portions of the film on Tuesday. The movie _ which has been R-rated, meaning it is not recommended for people under 17 years old _ depicts the crucifixion of Jesus and includes violent scenes. At least 16 students are believed to have seen portions of the film, Massie told The Associated Press.

School officials learned of the incident when a parent complained, Massie said.

The school sent a note to parents Wednesday, saying the film shouldn't have been shown and that the teacher believed it connected historical events from the students' social studies book.

Massie said Anthony "used oor judgment" and should have relied on more appropriate materials to for the lesson.

Attempts to reach Anthony for comment were unsuccess-

School officials also said they are looking into how Anthony obtained a copy of the film, which has not been released on video.

The Mel Gibson film has drawn criticism from Jewish leaders who fear it will lead to anti-Jewish sentiment, while winning praise from some Christians for its portrayal of
