tractor availability. Also, she said the bill is the recommendation of a recent disparity study that is required by state law every five years.

"The 2003 study recommends that NCDOT follow federal guidelines which requires specific project-based goals for federal proiects." she said

Memory said the annual budget for road construction is approximately \$1 billion, while the department's total budget is about \$3 billion. From Sept. 2004 to May 2005, NC minority business es received 4.4 percent (\$28 million) of state dollars and 2.4 percent (\$19 million) of federal dollars.

Isaiah Green, president of Equal Treatment Now, has been watching the minority contracting bills in the Legislature closely

Green was happy to see House Bill 237 die at the Senate this year. The bill set goals for African Americans to win federally funded projects at 10 percent.

is that it should not be just a mere goal. Instead, it should be the law. It should be mandated that they get no less than 10 percent.

Title 6 federal regulations prohibit any form of discrimination in employment where federal funds are being allocated.

"We have been putting pressure on North Carolina to compel them to do the right thing with federal funds," Green added. Carnell Robinson, chair of

the N.C. Black Leadership Caucus, vehemently opposes

Bill 1127. Robinson does not understand why the state attorney general, the gover-nor and DOT officials are not supporting economic inclusion for African Americans.

"The attorney general should be up front and center trying to win this case for minority contractors," said Robinson, who said white general contractors are push-

ing for the bill

In 2003, minority businesses received \$35 million in contracts and women-owned businesses \$102 million. In 2004, that amount increased to \$108 million for minorities


and \$154 million for women. Memory said the increase is the result of expanded outreach and training to minority businesses. In 2002, DOT

Secretary Lyndo Tippett formed the Minority Contractor Expansion Expansion Council that recently set up a new mentoring program that pairs experienced prime contractors with smaller ones.

Memory added that the agency also reorganized the Office of Civil Rights to allow the division to focus more on business development.
