Liberal Catholics, Protestants unite against Christmas stories

There has been ample tumult about efforts by businesses, cities and schools to avoid the label "Christmas" or downplay seasonal observances, and much of the protest has come from secular rather than church sources.

To many parishioners, perhaps the more important Grinches are Protestant and Catholic scholars who doubt the entire Christmas story as recorded in the Bible and regularly get attention in TV documentaries and news arti-

Various historical details are involved, but the central, long-running issue is the report in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke that Mary was a virgin who miraculously conceived through divine intervention and gave birth to Jesus

That debate is revived in "A Feminist Companion to Mariology," edited by Vanderbilt University's Amy-Jill Levine. Though liberal Protestants at the United Church of Christ's

Pilgrim Press published this anthology, the lead skeptics are liberal Roman Catholics from church-related campuses: Jane Schaberg of the University of Detroit Mercy and John Dominic Crossan, a retired professor at Chicago's DePaul University.

Meanwhile, popular level defense of the Nativity stories are included in The Case for Christmas: A Journalist/ Investigates Identity of the Child the Manger' (Zondervan) by evangelical

writer Lee Strobel. In the feminist anthology, Schaberg updates her "The Illegitimacy of Jesus," issued in 1990 by Crossroad, which specializes in Catholic and other religious titles.

Schaberg dismisses miraculous virginal conception (what Protestants call the "virgin birth") so she figures Mary was impregnated by someone other than Joseph before the couple married. That raises three possibilities: The unknown biological father raped Mary, he seduced her, or she chose to have sex with him and got pregnant.

(Conservatives protested graphic references to those scenarios by Dennis Leary in a sched-Christmas uled weekend special on TVs Comedy Central, and the U.S. Catholic bishpresident denounced the network's "ugly" and "especially offensive" treatment of Mary on the "South Park" show.)

Schaberg theorizes that the story about Mary's pregnancy outside wedlock was making the rounds, so the early church invented the virginal conception idea "under pressure" from the existence of this scandalous "illegitimacy tradition.

Muslims seek order against searches

BUFFALO-A group of Muslim-Americans asked a federal judge to allow them to travel to a religious conference in Canada later this month without being fingerprinted, photographed and held at the border, like they were on the way home from last year's gathering.

In a case that weighs the government's anti-terrorism efforts against the rights of its citizens, the New York Civil Liberties Union argued on the group's behalf for a court order prohibiting border agents from stopping and searching Muslim-Americans based solely on their attendance at the annual 'Reviv ing the Islamic Spirit" conference in Toronto Dec. 23-29

Homeland Security officials acknowledged subjecting those who attended last year's conference to lengthy security checks upon their return to the United States, but said they had reason to believe that people associated with terrorism planned to attend the conference or others like it.

NYCLU attorney Christopher Dunn accused the government of trampling the plaintiffs' right to practice religion in the name of homeland security

We fully respect the government's concerns about terrorism. That does not mean, however, that the Constitution disappears at the border," Dunn said.

An attorney for the govern-

ment said that while the stops may have taken too long, border agents did what was necessary to protect the country in light of credible intelligence.

"The concern was not that they went to a religious conference. The concern was that individuals, money, documents or weapons were going to get smuggled across the border," said Anthony Coppolino, who argued against the group's request.

The five plaintiffs, all New York residents, are among at least three dozen Muslim-American men and women who were corralled for as long as 6 1/2 hours at two western New York border crossings while trying to re-enter the United States by car.
