and are doing better because they got that education," said the Rev. Joe B. Fleming of Third Baptist Church.

"We have to be about transforming the world," said Fleming, who's interest in aiding Norfolk State was sharpened this spring by the General Assembly's refusal to

approve proposed funding for the university's library. Like others, he said his con-gregants feel the school does-n't always get a fair piece of the state financial pie. "They want to see NSU funded at the same level as other institutions in this area." he said.

Paul had already encouraged the Corinthians' giving

First, each of us must decide
in our hearts what we are
going to give. We do not want
to be like the hypocritical
Pharisees who gave for show
only and not for the needs of

only and not for the needs of the recipients.

Second, we should always give purposefully and not hesitantly or "grudgingly" as the Bible says. There is nothing worse than giving with a pang of conscience and then wishing later that you never gave in the first place. Third, we should give freely without having to be made to feel guilty by another party. This is what is called giving out "of necessity."

And lastly, we should give in a spirit of "cheerfulness," not one of sadness-as if sad to see your git leave your hands. Those who give cheerfully are doubly blessed because of the tremendous amount of inward satisfaction that takes place

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
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
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
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
