Looking back over the past football season of the Chowan Braves, the record shows five victories and one defeat for the year. The Braves opened the season at Buies Creek playing Campbell College. This game ended with Chowan winning 14-12. Probably the most outstanding play of the game was when Vance Stewart went off tackle for 76 yards and the first touchdown. This win was a team victory and proved to be an upset in the record books.

The team then journeyed to Clinton, N. C., where they took on Edwards Military Institute. Chowan proved to be superior winning 27-0. Frank Hitt was outstanding with his running and passing. He received help from Earl Goodwin, Billy Midgette, and Bobby Dough in the backfield. The line was immovable and played a great game.

Next the Braves faced the Hargrave Military Academy at Chatham. The Hargrave club proved to be a tough outfit, but fell to Chowan 13-0. Each man played to the best of his ability enabling the Braves to win the third straight.

Norfolk Catholic High was the next opponent to tangle with the Chowan club. The Braves play-

ing their first home game showed superior power to 2,150 fans, by rolling to a 33 to 13 victory. Little Buddy Bass proved his worth as he scored one touchdown on long runs continually throughout the game.

Elizabeth City High, ranking as the tenth best high school in N. C., was next to meet Chowan. Chowan successfully by-passed them 13 to 7 to remain undefeated.

Chowan then met the Presbyterian Junior College eleven in the final and homecoming game. Playing hard and leading throughout the game, the Braves fell in the final seconds as PJC scored on a pass. The extra point was made and PJC won 13-12.

Colerain was named after Colerain, Ireland. It is located on the Chowan River about fifteen miles from Tunis. Many, many decades before the days of Walter Reed, a merchant ship from the West Indies put in at Colerain with a few yellow mosquito stowaways. These people were the cause of a yellow fever epidemic which suddenly broke out and wiped out most of the town before it was finally brought under control.

Today, Colerain, in Bertie County, is a prosperous community of peanut and tobacco planters. It is the center of a fast growing fish and vegetable canning industry.

Between Colerain and Eden House, which is the home of Governor Charles Eden in Bertie County, there are a series of plantation houses of vintage, ancient in varying degrees. The Associated Press has picked its All-American squad with offensive and defensive units for the first time since the selection began 26 years ago.

The offensive unit chosen averages 196.1 pounds as compared with the defensive unit's 195.9.

The AP first team offensive backfield has four record breakers in Don Heinrich, Washington's brilliant quarterback and passer; Bobby Reynolds, Nebraska's terrific triple-threat sophomore; Everett (Sonny) Grandelius, Michigan State's hard-running left half and Dick Kazmaier, who led Princeton's Tigers to their first unbeaten season in 15 years. Dick is a tailback.

The defensive team consists of Frank Anderson of Oklahoma and Don Menasco of Texas at ends, Al Carapella of Miami, and Allen Wahl of Michigan at tackle, California's Les Richter and Tennessee's Ted Daffer at guards, and lists Elmer Stout of Army and Irvin Holdash of North Carolina as line backers. Chosen for the backfield were Bob Williams of Notre Dame, Vic Janowicz of Ohio State, and Eddie Salem of Alabama.

The second team (Offensive): Ends Bucky Curtis and Jim Doran, Tackles Jim Staton and C. T. Hewgley, Guards Pat Cannamella and John Biltz, Center John Pierik and Backs Vito Parrilli, Eddie Talbocm, John Bright and Kvie Rote.

The second team (Defense): Ends Baine and Bill McColl, Tackles Paul Lea and Elmer Costa, Guards Bernie Lemonick, and Mike Mierany, Linebackers Donn Moonmaw and Jerry Brown, and Backs Wilford White, Leon Heath, and John Botley.
