Guideposts For Life Are Cited

The Rev. W. D. Morris of the First Baptist Church of Scotland Neck delivered the baccalaureate address at Chowan College Sunday afternoon, pointing out three "guideposts" for students to follow during life.

Comparing human experience to an automobile moving along a highway, Mr. Morris called on the students to use three guideposts as an autoist uses such signs in his travel. The Bible, the church, and "inner conscience" were the guideposts that would "equip you to meet the trials and problems of a new day," Mr. Morris told the graduates.

Chowan College President F. Orion Nixon introduced the Rev. Mr. Morris. The invocation was said by the Rev. Oscar Creech, associate to the president. The Rev. Warren F. Taylor of the Murfreesboro Baptist Church led in the Scripture reading and prayer, and the benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Lonnie Sasser of Conway and Mt Tabor Baptist churches. The Chowan Glee Club under the direction of Mrs. Rose Goodwin Pool, sang two selections.

Describing the worth of the three guideposts, Mr. Morris asserted that the Bible contains "eternal truth," despite its age, and admonished the graduates to "have faith in, faith for, and live by" the Bible.

He said the church, despite charges of "conservatism" and "old, outmoded" teachings, was still "the greatest institution for building the Kingdom of God and a civilization that will last."

Mr. Morris called on the graduates to "exercise that inner conscience that is ever with you," especially in the "turbulent hours of today."

In his conclusion, Mr. Morris quoted the poem "Columbus," and challenged the graduates to "sail on" along "life's highway and on life's seas" with the help and aid of the Bible, church and inner conscience.

Commencement exercises will be in the college auditorium Friday beginning at 10:30 a. m.

The address will be by Dr. Spright Dowell, president of Mercer University, Macon, Ga.

Dr. F. O. Nixon will present associate of arts degrees to 11 members of the two-year graduating class and certificates in business administration to 27 members of the one-year graduating class.

"Pomp and Circumstance" by Elgar will be the processional to be played by Miss Virginia McQueen. The Rev. Mr. Creech will ask the invocation.

The glee club under the direction of Mrs. Rosa Goodwin Pool will sing "A Song in Thy Praise," by McCullers and "Hallelujah Chorus" from "The Messiah" by Handel.

Dr. Nixon will introduce the speaker.

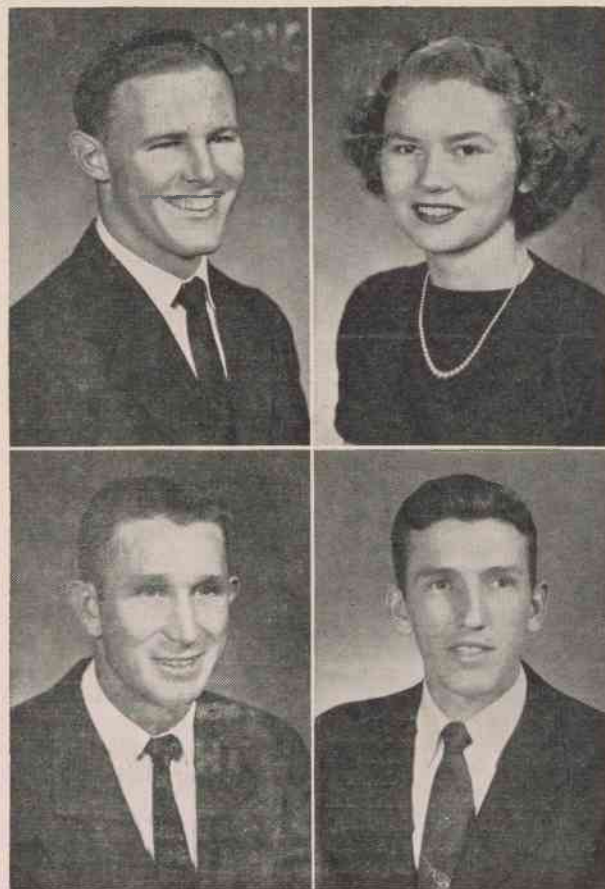
Mrs. J. S. Penny of Raleigh will make further announcement on the special organ fund.
