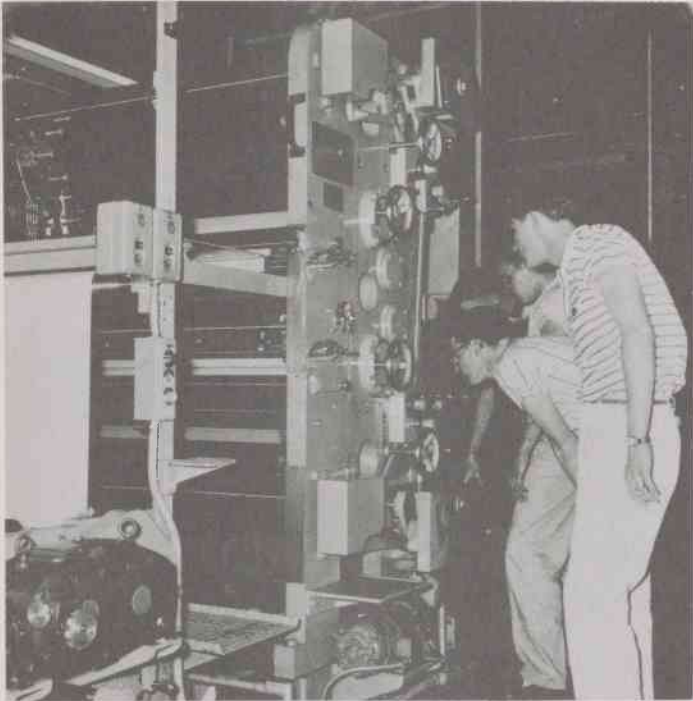
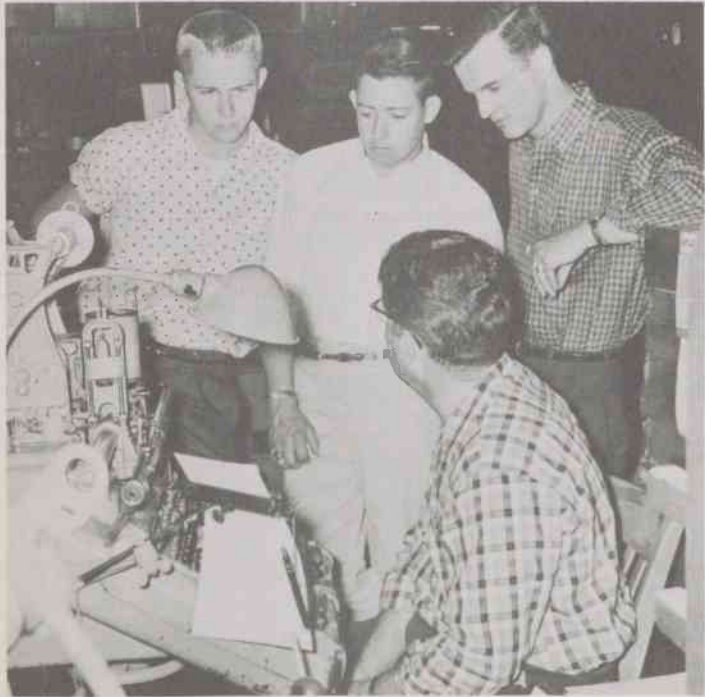


Graphic Arts Students Visit Plants

On Tuesday, April 7, and Thursday, April 9, the Graphic Arts students took two field trips, one to the Union Bag-Camp Paper Company in Franklin, Va., and the other to Edwards and Broughton Company and The News and Observer Company, both in Raleigh.

At the paper company on Tuesday the group from Chowan took an over-all look at the processes in making paper. They saw the logs being stripped of their bark, the fibers being washed and put on a screen, and the fibers being pressed into a sheet and dried, with the finished product being paper.

In Raleigh, the Chowan group visited the Edwards and Broughton Company. They were met by Mr. Hardison who briefed them about the plant.

They saw the various offset presses, along with the Linotypes and Teletypesetter machines. They also saw the new multi-color offset press being installed which costs approximately \$150,000.

Visiting the modern and attractive News and Observer building on Thursday, the group was met by Mr. Frank Daniels, Jr. He showed the students through the various departments of newspaper production. Making up ads, watching pages being formed, and plates being made by stereotype were highlights of the tour. They also saw the evening paper, The Raleigh Times printed on the huge rotary press. After it was printed, it took only two and a half minutes to get it to the news stands and various routes.

The group from the printing school would like to express their sincere gratitude to Mr. Delbrook of the Union Bag-Camp Paper Company, Mr. Hardison of the Edwards and Broughton Company, and to Mr. Daniels for their interest and help in making these field trips so valuable.

The Baptist Student Union offered many opportunities which helped to develop a Christian atmosphere on the campus. I can truthfully say that the two years I spent at Chowan College were ones that I'll always cherish. Thank you, Chowan, for playing such an important role in my life."

In another recent letter, Mary Lou Cowan Jernigan of Windsor, a 1956 secretarial graduate now employed by the Bertie County Health Department, had this to say: "I was raised in a Christian home and felt right at home at Chowan. It was wonderful to be in a school where the faculty and students gathered together for worship . . . I do not believe there is a better business department anywhere than the one right here in our own area. . . . In closing I would like to say that I would have to write a book to express my love and appreciation for 'my dear old Alma Mater'."

The Rev. W. R. Grigg, director of the Department of Interracial Cooperation of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, was the speaker at the regular monthly "Denominational Day" Program on Wednesday, April 1.

Mr. Grigg, who came to his present position two years ago from a similar post in Louisiana, described in detail the various ministries which are performed through the department he heads. Then, he pointed out certain guiding principles for those who would make Christianity a vital thing in their lives.

"In order for one to be dynamically Christian," Mr. Grigg said, "he must decide to follow these principles daily: (1) the impartial value that God places on the person as an individual; (2) the impartial value that God places upon churches; (3) the equality of rights of all individuals within a community, state, nation, and the world; (4) the essence of Christian stewardship, which is well stated by the following, 'To have is to owe, not to own; to share and not to hoard'; (5) the willingness to be and act like God since we are his children by 'grace through faith'."

Chowan's business department faculty, in addition to Mr. Ruffin, a native of nearby Powellsville, includes Professors James R. Masters, a Tennessean educated at Berea College in Kentucky, and the University of Tennessee, and L. M. Wallace, Jr., of Washington, N. C., whose undergraduate and graduate work was done at East Carolina College.

The Chowan College trustees, in light of the rapidly expanding enrollment in the business department, have included a new Business Building in their current enlargement - development program plans
