The four student cottages on Chowan's campus have been moved back to make way for the new men's dormitory, which is expected to be ready for occupancy by the fall term beginning in September, weather permitting.

In a recent interview with The Rev. Oscar Creech, director of Chowan College's development program, he said the four cottages had an interesting beginning. They were built in the spring of 1949. This was the year that Chowan reopened after having been closed in 1943. Rev. Creech went on to say, the cottages were built to offer additional accommodations for boys. People of Murfreesboro furnished the money to build the four cottages.
