Record Enrollment For Spring Term

Another enrollment record has been recorded by Chowan College which, during one five-year period, had the largest percentage of increase in enrollment among all North Carolina colleges, both private and public.

According to an announcement from the Office of the Registrar, Chowan's record enrollment for this spring semester is 1,060. Chowan College's growth in enrollment and facilities during recent years has shown a steady increase and, although a record, this is only a slight increase over the enrollment of 1,034 recorded for the 1966 spring semester, which was a record at that time. Chowan's enrollment for the fall semester, was 1,234, as against an enrollment of 1,187 in the fall of 1966.


Sophomores account for 637 of Chowan's spring semester students; freshmen, 401; nursing students in the final session of Chowan's 33-month Nursing Program, seven; and there are 15 students in other classifications.

New record enrollments have been established by almost every semester since 1957, when Dr. Bruce E. Whitaker became Chowan's president and there were 235 students enrolled. Chowan's total assets during that time, increasing to meet the needs of its rapidly growing student enrollment, have grown from less than \$1,000,000. to \$5,000,000. and nine new buildings have risen on the campus scene.

Most Chowan students, 85 percent, are enrolled in the liberal arts and sciences curriculum. Sixty students are in the college's School of Graphic Arts, 44 in Chowan's 33-month Nursing Program operated in conjunction with Ahoskie's Roanoke-Chowan hospital, and a number of others enrolled in terminal business and professional courses.
