Trustees approve record budget for '88-89

The Board of Trustees, meeting jointly with the Board of Advisors in September, approved a record budget of \$8,660,000 for the 1988-89 session. They heard Business Manager Ben C. Sutton report that the \$125,000 1987-88 Annual Giving goal was topped by more than \$6,000.

Dean of Students Clayton Lewis reported the fall enrollment was 966 full time students, an increase of 57 over last year. He said applications increased by 20 percent.

Dr. B. Franklin Lowe, Jr., Dean of the College, said the college's accreditation has been reaffirmed for the next 10 years by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Dr. Whitaker praised Dean Lowe for the leadership he provided in the campus-wide reaffirmation effort.

Resolutions Adopted


