With Pure-Bred Americans of North Carolina Leading With the Highest Birth Rate Known in This Country, There is Proof That the Anglo-Saxon Stock Will Not "Breed Out" for the Lack of New G. Blood and Prolificness.

Greensboro News. The highest birth rate in the Union and one of the lowest death rates, combine to explain North Carolina's rapid increase in population, for we have had slittle immigration, according to once put in practice, it becomes the February bulletin of the State Board of Health. The birth was 328 per thousand—not merely the highest in the Union. but the highest ever recorded in this country. Three years ago Utah's birth rate went as high as 81.9; but North Carolina's figure for 1920 has never been touched. At the same time, the death rate was 12.9 per thousand. This is an excess of approxi-mately 20 per thousand, or an increase in population of two per cent a year. The precise figures are, births, 83,966; deaths, 33,228 making the natural increase of the population of the State for the year a trifle over 50,000.

These figures upset some theories that had gained pretty general credence. For instance, we have been assured that the only really prolific element in American life is the immigrant gradually being replaced by the newer importations, because the primitive vigor of the original British and Teutonic strains has weakened as economic conditions improved. We have been assured that America is doomed within a few generations, to beacteristics on account of this supposed sterility of the human breeds ioosely termed Anglo-Saxon.

But it so happens that North Carolina is by much the most American State in the Union. We have no foreign element at all, comparatively speakingcertain of their descendants are North Carolinians to this day. But discarding the obscure earl ier settlements, about which there is dispute, the written his-

tory of the State goes back 262 years, ranking it among the oldimmigration of importance into North Carolina since about 1850. That is why our people are 99.5 per cent American-born children of American-born parents.

Undoubtedly, though, the thing on which the State has most reason to pride itself is the showing made in the matter of the death rate. That is now down to 129 per thousand, well below the average for the United States. But it ought to be lower. Far enough north to escape the fevers of the sub-tropical regions, far enough south to es-cape the rigors of northern winters, if we do not reduce our death rate below that of less favored sections, the fact is prima facie evidence of some-thing wrong with us. With the climate she has, North Oarolina ought to be as free from tuberculosis and malaria as she is from beri-beri; and every civilized ommunity has it within its power to make typhoid as rare as typhus. Still, a death rate of 12.9 is evidence that we are not neglecting the first principles of public health, and the State Board of Health has reason to congratulate itself on the show-
