Reports from all sections of the State indicate considerable improvement in employment, and it is anticipated that funds made available will be sufficient to meet the necessary relief needs. It is probable that relief needs for June will be nearly twenty per cent under the needs for May. The county allotment for Lee for June was \$2,620.
