## GREAT PROGRAM HEARD AT STATE CONVENTION

Those attending the 31st State Farmers and Farm Women's Convention, the opportunity of hearing some of the held at State College last week, had nation's agricultural leaders in addition to taking part in discussions conducted by their own folks from the farms of North Carolina.

Approximately 1250 persons registered at the convention at the College headquarters with an additional number filling local hotels in Raleigh. County agents, vocational teachers and grange lecturers were housed at Meredith College. At the general evening sessions from 3,000 to 4,000 were in attendance. During the day the delegates scattered over the campus to attend various sectional gatherings.

Some time was devoted to recreation each evening after supper, there was community singing and following the prepared programs, games, dances were held on Edick Field.

"The two officers of the convention, L. H. McKay, of Hendersonville, and Mrs. Dewey Bennett, of Hanes; conducted the program in an admirable way," declared Dean O. I. Schaub.

Secretary of Agriculture, Henry A. Wallace, was the principal speaker on the program, flying to Raleigh by plane to address the opening session on Monday evening, July 24th. C. A. Cobb, cotton chief, and others of the administration were present.

Banquets and business meetings of the ten farm organizations meeting at the College, were held during the week. In the opinion of the College officials, the convention this year was one of the best of the 31 years the organized farmers of the state have met at their agricultural college.

**IMPROVE ONE ACRE, URGES FARM LEADER**

It is entirely possible and within the means of every North Carolina farmer to improve at least one acre of cultivated land each season.

"There is no need for us to overlook the fact that all of us cultivate land which will not produce enough yield to pay the cost of production," declared L. H. McKay, of Hendersonville, in his opening address as president of the North Carolina Farmers' Convention meeting at State College last week. "In view of this fact, each of us should determine to improve at least one acre of land each season. We can do this by using ground limestone, planting legumes, and stopping all erosion. We are following this plan on my farm and intend to continue until we have made each open acre profitable."

Mr. McKay said average yields of 15 bushels of corn, 252 pounds of lint cotton and 625 pounds of flue cured tobacco were common. Yet on improved acres 135 bushels of corn has been grown; 1600 pounds of lint cotton and 2600 pounds of flue cured tobacco. These yields are matters of record, he said, and mean that the land on which they were produced had been improved until it really paid to farm it.

Mr. McKay made it clear that he did not mean any half way measures of improvement.

"We are working land which it would be better not to put a plow in it," he said. "We do not know how we are wasting our labor until we see the results of improving a piece of land. The hope for success in farming lies in increasing our yields per acre and in balancing our production. I am glad to note the strides in growing food crops made in recent years."

## POULTRY COST CUT BY USING GREEN FEED

Careful planning of the poultry feeding program is essential this year in view of the increased prices of feeds.

"There is no subsidy granted to the poultry producer as far as price for his product is concerned and the industry is confronted with the problem of cutting the cost of production at every point," said Roy S. Dearstyne, head of the poultry department at North Carolina State College, in urging a balanced program of crops to cut feed expense.

Prof. Dearstyne lists three vital facts essential to producing poultry crops—the Value of Green Feed, Desirable Grazing Crops, and Crops for Autumn Grazing.

Green feed plus sunshine should supply vitamins in a satisfactory quantity to "an abundant supply of succulent maintain the health of the birds, if a balanced mash is available at all times and scratch grain is fed. When green feed is lacking, the mash must be reinforced with some vitamin bearing supplement, usually in the form of cod liver oil.

"However, this supplement is costly and may be reduced by a desirable grazing crop. There are three essentials of a desirable grazing crop: it must be tender, succulent, low in fibre, easily digested and relished by the birds; it must supply abundant grazing and remain tender over the great et period of time; and, the cost of production may be relatively low.

"Green feeds in the autumn when eggs usually bring a high price is a grain feeding. One of the best grazing crops for this state is Italian ryegrass which can be successfully grown in practically every county. It is best adapted in well drained loam, sandy and clay loam soils and should be sowed in Sept. or early in Oct. and will supply grazing from November 1st until June."

Crimson clover, oats and rape are three other fall crops that poultry relish, Derastyne says.

## TIMELY FARM QUESTIONS ANSWERED AT STATE COLLEGE

**Question: What is the best material to use for floors in poultry laying houses?**

**Answer: By all means put in concrete floor if possible. While wood and dirt floor are used they are unsanitary and hard to keep clean. A concrete floor laid over a six inch foundation of cinders, broken stone or gravel will last indefinitely and at the same time will be easy to clean and keep clean. Wood floors are cheaper but do not have the life of a concrete floor and are not sanitary.**

**Question: Would black soil from salt marshes be good to put on land that is being cultivated?**

**Answer: This black soil in all probability, contains certain amounts of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash, and, while not as readily available as in commercial fertilizer, will add some plant food in the soil. The organic matter in the black soil will also be of considerable value in improving the physical condition of the cultivated lands especially if they are of sand or of a sandy nature. Where the cost of getting the black soil to the cultivated fields does not exceed 75 cents per ton the application would be profitable.**

**Question: How soon can farmers plow up the cotton acreage contracted to the government?**

**Answer: Cotton should be destroyed as soon as the permit is received from the County Agent or person acting in that capacity. After the cotton is plowed up the fields must be inspected by the local committee and certified as destroyed before settlement can be made. The sooner the cotton is plowed up, therefore, and the field inspected the sooner the grower will receive payment.**

## BREF NEWS ITEMS

Catawba county truck growers report unusually good prices for all vegetable grown this season due to the dry weather injuring most gardens about local towns and cities.

Between 20 and 30 young colts have been foaled in McDowell county this spring with some farmers having two colts to the farm.

In a campaign to eradicate fowl pox in Alamance county, the farm agent has vaccinated 5,000 pullets this summer.

E. C. Parrish, of Durham county, established an irrigation system this season with which to grow vegetables despite dry weather.

Last week 250 men and boys took part in a tour to study forestry work conducted by five leading farmers of Yadkin county.

Ralph Clippard, of Caldwell county has dug a trench silo with a capacity of 60 tons. He says it will furnish silage for 30 cows during 182 days.

Pitt county farmers will plow up 4,917 acres of cotton as a result of the reduction campaign, reports farm Agent E. F. Arnold.

In addition to a 20 per cent reduction of the acreage to cotton in Scotland county during the past four years, growers agreed to plow up 6,018 acres in the campaign just closed.

## DIRECTOR HARRELSON EXPLAINS FOREST FIRE CONTROL IN N. C.

Forest fire protection activities of the Emergency Conservation Camps on private lands allotted to state supervision are limited under Federal restrictions to counties operating in the state's forest fire control system, Col. J. W. Harrelson, Director of the Department of Conservation and Development, said recently in explaining why it is not possible to extend the work to all counties making request.

The restriction of the special forest fire protection to cooperating counties, the conservation director set forth, was decided upon by the U. S. Forest Service before the camps were allotted to the supervision of the State.

Following are the counties in the state organization which were eligible to receive the benefits of work of the conservation camps at the beginning of the current fiscal year: Buncombe, Haywood, Henderson,
