While much of the cotton along the highways had rather a small stalk it seemed to be heavily fruited. There is prospect of a big crop of cotton in Lee county being gathered this fall. Of course the crop would have been larger had not some of the acrage been plowed up. Many of the planters had gathered most of their tobacco crop. In many fields there was nothing but the stripped, gaunt stalks left. We are informed that much of the tobacco that has been gathered is of a very good grade. By the time the farmers get their tobacco gathered and cured they will have to get busy in their cotton and fodder crops. One thing that attracted our attention was that many of the farmers were gathering their fodder in the old way, stripping it from the stalk by hand. This means that the corn will be pulled, hauled to the crib and shucked in the old way. Corn shuckings have not entirely "gone out" in
