(Continued From Page One.) A charity patient is one who is admitted to the hospital because he is sick and is unable to pay his bills. He receives the same treatment, the same nurses care for him, and he receives the same food and supplies as does a patient who pays.

Fifty-eight per cent of the patients treated in the hospital in 1933 were charity patients. If patients are not admitted to a room and put to bed they are treated and classified as out patients. If they are able to pay an mergency room charge is made but patients. A record is kept of all out patients and 747 cases were treated in 1933. The hospital receives no com pensation for these out patients not for the county. The total number of laboratory examinations for in paing constantly on the job, induced tal for out patients was 151.
