STATE NEWS

Condensed Items of Interest Happening Throughout the State.

A survey is being made from a point on the A. C. L. near Grifton, toward New Bern. The surveying party is maintaining absolute secrecy as to the purpose of the survey and there is more or less speculation concerning it. The opinion is held by many that it is being done for the Atlantic Coast Line Company, and that the company contemplates building a line to connect at New Bern with the New Bern and Wilmington branch, and also that it will go to Norfolk via New Bern.—Kinston, N. C. Free Press.

While crossing Pamlico sound Sunday, against a heavy gale and high seas, four barges being towed by the steam tug Frank Esberick, broke their hawsers and went adrift near Brant Island. All efforts to pick them up were of no avail on account of the storm raging. The tug came on to New Bern with the barge Celestine McNally in tow. Those adrift were the J. H. Marvill, Atlas, Saturn and Safety. It was learned yesterday that they had been safely anchored without harm to crews and craft. The Esberick returned yesterday to tow them in.—New Bern Journal.

Two remarkably fine specimens of the octopus or "devil fish" were captured by Mr. Don VanDuzen at the Wrightsville beach Saturday afternoon and Sunday. Mr. VanDuzen was walking along the water's edge Saturday afternoon with a cast net over his shoulder, when the octopus reached out after it and the fish was pulled ashore. Sunday afternoon he hooked one of them with a heavy fish line baited with mullet. The specimens will be preserved and sent to the University of North Carolina for scientific research.—Wilmington, N. C. Star.

It is expected that Judge J. S. Adams will hear the habeas corpus case involving the legal custody of seven-year-old Constance Turner, whose mother claims her under a divorce decree rendered in Florida, and whose relatives here insist that the lawful custody is with them. It has been stated the little girl has been living with her grandmother until Saturday when her mother arrived and took her to Baltimore where she was taken by Deputy Sheriff Williams under writ of habeas corpus procedure by the relatives to whose care she was later left pending a decision by Judge Adams, which is expected to be rendered tomorrow.—Ashville Citizen.

The State Agricultural Department takes a new step in making a display of this State's agricultural products in the State museum during the meeting of the Farmers' National Congress here November 3-5. It will not only make this exhibit, but will offer special premiums to the farmers and these will be well worth competing for. In a day or two the list will be announced. In this connection it may be interesting to know that in all probability Wake county will this season show the largest yield to the acre of both corn and cotton ever on record in this State. This is the opinion of that veteran and farmer, Capt. Bailey T. Williamson, of Raleigh, who has been out to see some of the crops grown in the contests now on here. He said he never saw such corn and cotton before in his life. Capt. Williamson thinks that in this section cotton will be an average crop on good and well cultivated uplands. Elsewhere it is badly hurt.

There will be a very interesting hearing of the National Guard matter here Thursday by Governor Kitchen, this coming up from Fayetteville. In 1792 a company was organized there and this rendered services to the Governor in the war of 1842. There is in the State Museum one of the muskets the English made, bought by the company in 1792, the name of the organization being the Fayetteville Independent Life Infantry. The Legislature in 1819 gave the company a separate organization with a major and four captains. The company was for a number of years in the State Guard. In the Second regiment, but withdrew. It served in the Second regiment of United States volunteers during the war with Spain and was in camp here. About nine years ago it was claimed that the company entered the National Guard and became Company F of the Second regiment and has been on duty ever since, there being at the same time another organization, with private uniforms and arms privately purchased. Company F gets the National and State appropriations, etc., and the Legislature at the last session gave the other company \$250 annually. There has been for some time a conflict, it seems, growing out of this condition of affairs and the hearing will be of no little interest to guardsmen generally. Captain Edward R. McKethan commands Company F. Major John C. Vann commanding the other organization. News and Observer.

CHILD'S IMITATION.

As the child grows older the power of observation grows. Appearance and action are noted, and distinguished, and at a very early age they begin to imitate what they observe. It is impossible to over estimate the power acquired from this. Imitation has been the chief agency in making the world what it is today, and to it you and I owe our customs, our dress and our habits of life. Without it, the human race would still be merely animals, and our little animals, the children, would be incapable of education. To be sure, they cannot learn in our adult way, but only as a child. Things of an abstract nature are unnoticed by them, but they see and hear; nothing objective escapes them. This suggests the keynote of all successful training. The child is influenced by what we do, hence the necessity of absolute honesty and genuine kindness in home and in the schoolroom. Do you wish them to be truthful, to respect law, to love their neighbors as themselves? All these things must be seen in their own home and in the school, for the child reflects with unerring accuracy not what they are told, but what they see others do. As it has been said, the best teacher for the little child is a good mother. The world, it is true, is full of noble parents; but every fibre in the child's body yearns for sympathy, a mother's love, and long before they are able to express themselves in words, they know by instinct what the world is. Nothing can take the place of their sympathy, and no human being can become a complete substitute for the mother. A weak, careless mother may be better for the child than a good teacher, or family relatives.
