**STATE NEWS**

Condensed Items of Interest Happening Throughout the State.

W. M. Bennett, the young man who gave information to the police last Saturday night which resulted in the arrest of four well-known traveling men upon a charge of gambling, and who later disappeared, was arrested in Winston yesterday, upon a warrant from this city and required to deposit a cash bond of \$100 for his appearance here November 5, when the case is set for hearing in municipal court. The facts in the case are familiar to readers of this paper, it being recalled that Bennett is the young man who went to the police and claimed that he had lost \$50 in a poker game at a local hotel, the police at once raided the building, but the game had broken up and the warrants were then issued and served upon information given by Bennett. When the case was called for a hearing in municipal court, however, Bennett failed to appear and the police were thereby unable to offer any evidence against the four defendants.—Greensboro News.

Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson, of Baltimore, the senior bishop of the Southern Methodist Episcopal Church will preside at the North Carolina conference here November 24th in Edenton street church. The last conference at Raleigh was held years ago and Bishop Hargrove presided in 1874 the centennial of Methodism was celebrated here, the meeting being held in the city hall, and at that conference six bishops were present. It is expected there will be 400 regular delegates at the conference and the Raleigh Methodists will provide that many with homes.

Governor Kitchin pardons H. P. Griffin, who was a policeman at Hamlet and shot and killed a negro he was arresting, and who last March began a term of one year in the penitentiary for manslaughter, coming here himself with his commitment papers and entering the prison. The governor said that under the testimony Griffin was properly convicted and sentenced, but that there has come to light evidence which in the opinion of the judge would have brought a verdict of acquittal had it been submitted to the jury. The solicitor and every juror recommended pardon, as do hundreds of citizens, there being no protest. Griffin's prison record was good and so was his character.—Raleigh correspondent.

A general mixup took place yesterday morning on South Front street at the intersection of Middle. Two cab drivers, one coming down Middle street and the other crossing the street came together with terrific

force. Both men were driving their horses at a very fast gate, and when they collided both of the animals were thrown to the ground and one of the cabs overturned. Claud Simpson, driver of the cab that was overturned, was thrown out on the pavement, but escaped with only a few scratches, the other driver was unhurt.—New Bern Journal.

James Lewis, a young man of Chicod township, planted one acre of tobacco on land rented from Israel Edwards, and his crop weighed, when ready for market, 964 pounds. He sold it at the S. W. Warehouse in Greenville for \$231.62. After paying all expenses of cultivation, rent, &c., he had the nucleus of a very nice little bank account to his credit. Go then and do likewise.—Greenville Reflector.

With the arrival yesterday of the British steamer Wragby, Capt. Olsen, from Tenerife, there are six British vessels in port to receive cotton for foreign export—the largest number for the present season. The receipts of cotton at the port during the past week have been large and the price remains at 15 cents for middling. One steamer has already cleared this week and several others will receive cargoes within the next few days. In the last edition of the Maritime Register the British steamers Hohenfeld and Tabaristan from foreign ports are noted as chartered for this port. The vessels come to Alexander Sprunt & Son.—Wilmington Star.

Mr. W. J. Moore, Sr., had two vehicles, loaded with cattle from the "Banks," to come in port last Sunday morning. While unloading them one of the steers got mad and jumped at a colored man and knocked him down and got on top of him. The man got out and started to get up and the beast hooked him down again. The man got up again and succeeded this time in getting clear. No injury was done the man as the steers horns grew so that he could not gore. Had it not been for the horns peculiar growth the steer would have gored him to death.—Oriental News.
