ANOTHER BUSY DAY IN COURT

Many Cases Disposed of Yesterday by Judge Ward.

Judge Ward is rapidly disposing of the criminal docket, as will be seen by the following cases disposed of on Tuesday, the second day of the term:

State vs. Amos Whitehurst; carrying concealed weapon; tried, guilty, fined \$15 and costs.

State vs. Tilden Brooks; assault with deadly weapon; plead guilty, fined \$5 and costs.

State vs. Cain Moore; larceny; judgment suspended.

State vs. Allen Cowell; embezzlement; tried, guilty, 10 months on county roads.

State vs. Jno. Moore; carrying concealed weapon; tried, guilty, 10 months on county roads.

State vs. Jerry Latham and Harry Moore; assault with deadly weapon; defendants plead guilty; Latham fined \$20 and one-half of costs; Moore fined \$10 and one-half of costs.

State vs. Henry Miller; assault with deadly weapon; plead guilty, 10 months on county roads.

State vs. Samuel Robinson; larceny; tried, guilty; 4 months on county roads.

State vs. John Mayo; assault with deadly weapon; tried, not guilty.

State vs. John Binns Whitehurst; fornication and adultery; tried, guilty, 12 months on county roads.

State vs. Alex. Cutler; larceny; tried, guilty, 10 months on county roads.

State vs. Nat Williams and Gilbert Lucas; gambling; tried, guilty, 6 months each on the county roads.

Judgment suspended upon payment of costs and upon his entering into bond in the sum of \$100 for his good behavior for one year.

State vs. B. H. Graham and Chas. Williams; assault with deadly weapon; continued.

State vs. B. H. Graham; carrying concealed weapon; continued.

State vs. Cain Moore; larceny; tried, guilty, 12 months on county roads.

State vs. William Lee; retelling, not a true bill.

State vs. Jim Moore, Henry Clapp, Jno. Slade and Henry Rainer; gambling; tried, not guilty.

State vs. Jim Harvey; retelling; tried, guilty, 5 months on county roads.

State vs. Robt. Francis; carrying concealed weapons; plead guilty, fined \$10 and costs.

State vs. David Williams and Henry Slade; assault with deadly weapon; Slade pleads guilty, judgment suspended upon payment of one-half of costs; David Williams tried and found guilty, and sentenced to 6 months on the county roads.

State vs. Romeo Grimes; larceny; tried, guilty, judgment suspended upon payment of costs.

State vs. L. N. Harding; retelling; not a true bill.
