 There is, in the Pantego High School library a fac simile of the first copy of the Maryland Journal and the Baltimore Advertiser, now called the Baltimore American, presented by Mr. Thos. Green. This paper was printed Friday, August 26, 1773. The type is very small—it has only four pages and three columns to each page. The manner of advertising is entirely different from what it is now, there being illustrations used. Several runaway slaves are spoken of and a reward offered to any one who would bring them back. Nearly all the nouns are capitalized and the old "s" is almost entirely used. In the old paper is a letter written from Mount Vernon, Virginia, July 15, 1773, by George Washington, in regard to his 20,000 acres of land on the Ohio and Great Kanawha rivers in what is now West Virginia.
