Leave in Morning for Wilmington

Company G, under the command of Capt. Nurwood L. Simmons, will leave tomorrow morning on the Norfolk and Southern road for Wilmington, where they expect to take part in the celebration of "Taft Day" tomorrow. The company expects to return home Tuesday night. They will go to Wilmington by special train. Several are contemplating going as visitors. Col. H. Churchill Bragaw, who will be in charge of the troops, will have 17 companies under his immediate command. Companies are to be present from the First, Second and Third N. C. Infantries and bands of the Third N. C. and the First S. C. Infantries. Besides the regular infantry, Captain Hancock will have three companies of coast artillery with band; Captain Weddell, two companies of coast-artillery; Captain Daniels with several divisions of naval reserves and crew of the U. S. Seminole. The members of Company G are anticipating a big time. Nearly all the men will go.

FUNERAL OF AUTO VICTIMS. Greenville, Nov. 8.—The funerals of Mr. Harry Skinner, Jr., and ex-State Senator J. L. Fleming, who were killed in the automobile accident Friday evening, took place Sunday, the former in the morning at 11 o'clock and the latter in the afternoon at 3 o'clock. Scores of sympathetic telegrams from this and other States were received by the bereaved families. The condition of the other two parties in the wreck, E. G. Flaughan and S. C. Wooten, is yet very serious. Mr. Flaughan having several broken ribs, a dislocated shoulder and internal injuries and Mr. Wooten concussion of the brain and internal injuries.

A GOOD MOVE. News comes from Washington, N. C. that a flour mill with capacity of 50 barrels a day has been erected. This will prove not only a convenience to the farmers in that section who now raise wheat, but will be an incentive to others to put some of their land to this grain. If the proprietors of that mill succeed others will be built in its section, and as the mills increase in number, enlarging the home demand for wheat, more of this grain will be sown. There is no reason why North Carolina mills should not turn out as good flour as the people want. It used to be done in olden times, before the people abandoned growing wheat through depending on Western wheat fields and Western flour mills in order that they might devote all their energies to raising cotton. In piedmont North Carolina the number of mills, including steam roller mills, is even now considerable.

The high price of cotton, instead of causing the farmers to increase acreage and go in for nothing but cotton, should have the opposite effect. In it they should see occasion for greater diversification of crops and more intensive farming. With 15-cent or 12-cent cotton more money can be made on a few acres than can be realized from a much larger planting while cotton is selling for 5 or 9 cents. With cotton bringing a high price not so much need be planted for what has heretofore been considered the only money crop of the Southern farmer. The high price should furnish an incentive to plant fewer acres, fertilizing and cultivating these well, and to put in large crops of grains and other farm products. The large yields of corn and wheat which are being made in this State under the improved methods of farming show that cotton is no longer the only money crop. And that the farms which yield the greatest net profits to their owners are those on which many kinds of crops are grown—not alone for home consumption, but also for market.

The establishment of flour mills, which will create a home demand for wheat at prices profitable to the growers, will cause more wheat to be grown, to the improvement of agricultural conditions. Therefore such news items as that from Washington should be of general interest.—Charlotte Observer.
