These farms, consisting of one or two acres of land adjacent to the schools, are planted to various crops and are cultivated by the school children.

Second. One Oliver Chilled Plow. Donated by N. S. Fulford Hardware Company. Won by C. W. Bowen, Jessama, N. C.

International Harvester Company's Feed Mill. Won by J. Walter Perry, Okisco, N. C. This was for the largest yield of Horsetooth corn, 86 1-2 bushels.

Reapers, Pungo, N. C., for the best 10 ears of any other variety. Bailey Supply Company, corn sheller. Won by W. H. Ross, Aurora, N. C., for the best 10 ears white corn.

Swamp Land—Best Ten Ears Corn, with white cob. Two dollars in gold.

Mr. W. E. Swain, of Aurora, won the gun offered by E. R. Mixon & Company for the longest ear of corn. His sample measured 12 3-4 inches.

Norfolk and Southern Prizes. First prize was won by Master Lester Forehead, of Chowan county, for having the largest yield per acre in the boys' contest. He raised 94 bushels.

For the largest yield in the men's contest, Mr. J. W. Perry, of Okisco, N. C., was the winner. He raised 86 1-2 bushels of the Horsetooth variety.

For the largest yield of any other variety, the winner was Mr. C. B. Parker, of Hertford.

For the best ten ears Horsetooth corn, first, C. W. Bowen, of Jessama; second, J. E. Ferrebe, of Camden.

Best of any other variety, first, W. A. Reapers, of Pungo; second, E. S. Simmons, Fairfield.

Just before the prize winners were announced Hon. John H. Small, introduced to the large number waiting in front of the skating rink, Mr. William Beatty Powell, of Shadeland, Pennsylvania. Mr. Powell was on his way home from Raleigh, where he attended the National Farmers' Congress. He is a large land owner in his native State and also has interests in North Carolina. Mr. Powell was most happy in his remarks.
