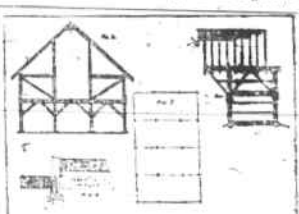

IDEAL COW BARN.

A Plan That Every Dairyman Should Study Carefully.

The accompanying four illustrations give detail of a brace frame barn 42 feet with 20-foot posts. The barn is built of 2x4 or 2x6-inch scantlings throughout. There is not a single piece larger in the whole frame.

Profit in Butter.

There is a good profit in making butter at home. If you can get a high grade product and have a good market for it, the creamery pays you only for an exact pound of butter fat, with two or three pounds of milk thrown in for nothing.

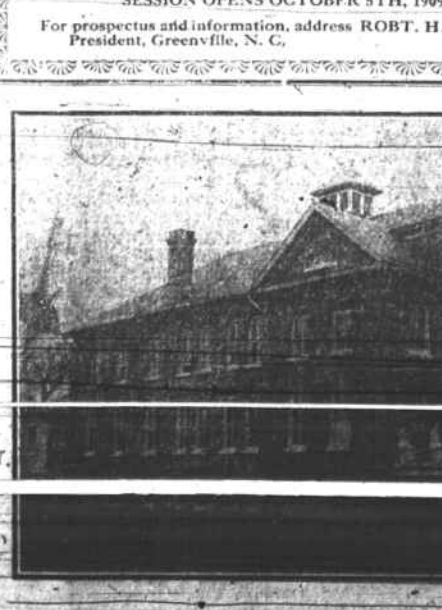
