THE INLAND WATERWAYS MEETING

(By Staff Correspondent) But few people in North Carolina know the objects of the association or of the vast work it has mapped out. The accomplishment of the great undertaking which it is advocating will mean more to Eastern Carolina and to the entire Atlantic seaboard than any other project which will come before the next congress.

The interest manifested at the meeting of the association in Norfolk was indeed inspiring to the supporters of this measure. Delegates were in attendance from every State along the Atlantic coast and from several inland States. The association is in its infancy. The report at Baltimore last year showed a deficiency, this year that deficiency was wiped out and a surplus of \$700 shown, with funds and pledges for the ensuing year which will show a surplus of more than \$2,000. In this connection The News desires to congratulate the Washington members upon being second on the list in record of subscription. This is a record of which our citizens should feel proud, especially so when you consider the fact that the cities of Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and numerous other large cities were represented.

Norfolk did itself proud in the entertainment of the association. Nothing but words of commendation and praise were heard from those in attendance. The program of the different fetes was elaborate and thoroughly enjoyed. Especially was this true of the oyster roast at Cape Henry and the smoker in the Armory hall. The parade was the greatest in the history of Norfolk, and the manner in which the crowds were handled shows that its citizens were equal to the opportunity.

It is not often on many representative business men of the entire country assemble on any occasion and they all were agreed that the hospitality and reception accorded them surpassed their most sanguine expectations.

THE IMPREGNABLE SOUTH.

Republican hope of breaking the solid South shows signs of a new lease, albeit the result in Virginia in November was calculated to force the opposite conclusion to the point of permanency. While years of hazy and often unfulfilled, the Republican press sees in the impression Mr. Taft made on the South the leaves that may energize the "process of emancipation" from sectional unity. Already, it is contended, the South is "ready to cast aside the unwarranted belief that a national Republican administration means something antagonistic to its best interests." That is not readily granted, but, even if true, it is not a new feeling. Mr. McKinley's attitude toward the South, especially during and after the Spanish-American war, disarmed any skepticism as to his desire to be the President of the whole people. Mr. Roosevelt fostered the era of good feeling, his outspoken sympathies and family ties giving him a popularity that encouraged some Republicans to think Georgia and perhaps other Southern States would be found in his column.

As for Mr. Taft's belief in the matter, it is said he does not share the hopeful opinion that the South can be swayed from without. The reading force must be of internal origin and impulse. Most likely, Mr. Taft's conclusion was drawn from the result in Virginia last year. He was better known personally to the people of that State than to any other except Ohio; nowhere in the South was he so popular as in the Old Do-

face, Mr. Taft's chances of breaking the South did not look remote. But Virginia voted as usual.

Once it was thought that with the negro eliminated from politics, the Southern Democracy would go to pieces. Well, the negro was eliminated, practically, and the Democrats fell out among themselves, as predicted. Factionalism is more rampant in the South than in any other section, but it is confined to State politics. All factions vote as a unit on the Presidency, and with a candidate and platform on old lines the South in future is apt to give increased Democratic majorities over recent years.

Vain is the Republican hope that a break will come from within. Solidarity came from without, and the impulse to break it up must come from without. The day for this will not dawn until a Republican administration at Washington expunges certain sectional amendments to the Constitution and certain sectional laws in the Federal statutes. True, they are falling into abeyance, but so long as they stand ready to be vitalized whenever partisan politics prompts, the South will be loath to accept the view that a Republican regime means nothing "antagonistic to its best interests."
