STATE NEWS

Condensed Items of Interest Happening Throughout the State.

The building of an electric line through piedmont North Carolina and extending to Greenville and Columbia, S. C., is a project which is being looked upon with much favor by local and Northern capitalists. The Dukes of Durham, the controlling force in the Southern Power Company, are the prime movers in this new venture which would mean much for the development of the section of country through which this electric system would pass.—News and Observer.

Rink Parnell, the 65-year-old white man who was arrested here Monday as published yesterday, on the basis of representations from Monroe that he was under suspicion of having fired the barn of J. M. Porter, in Union county, was released yesterday afternoon. It appeared that there was nothing tangible against him at Monroe.—Charlotte Observer.

The work of erecting the clock tower on the Federal building is progressing very slowly. The contractors are waiting for instructions to arrive from headquarters, and until that time the work will be practically suspended. When completed this will be one of the most modern clock towers in the State, and will show up to a better advantage. The construction of the tower will cost the government about \$15,000.—New Bern Journal.

Fire last night totally destroyed the plant of the Guilford Plaster and Cement company near the county fair grounds. The factory was situated at West Lee street extension and the Southern railway. The owners of the plant are S. N. Peters and J. White, who for several years have conducted a very successful business, and have succeeded in building up a large trade throughout the South. They are two popular young business men, and have many friends who will hear with regret of their misfortune. The loss is estimated at between \$20,000 and \$30,000, with about \$14,000 insurance. It could not be learned last night what the future of the concern will be, but it is presumed that they will commence at once the erection of another factory. The factory employed about 30 hands, all of whom will be thrown out of work for several days.—Greensboro News.

While trying to catch a freight train in motion this morning, Neal Whitlow, a young white man about 16 years of age, fell under the wheels and sustained injuries from which he is reported to be dying at the Charlotte Sanitarium. He was attempting to swing onto a moving freight near his home in Mount Airy. The affair occurred this morning about 10 o'clock. His hand slipped and he fell under the train, fracturing his skull, almost severing his left foot and badly mashing his left shoulder. He was brought to Charlotte on the Statesville train this afternoon and immediately carried to the sanitarium, where everything in medical skill was done to save his life. At 3:05 today he was reported to be dying. His father is with him.—Charlotte News.

It is good news that the A. C. L. officials have decided to split up the old Richmond district, which extends from Richmond to Florence, S. C., and create a new division or rather reestablish an old one, with headquarters in this city. The reestablished district will be known as the Fayetteville district, and will extend from Rocky Mount to Florence, S. C. The headquarters of the new division will be promoted to assistant superintendent, and will be in charge of the new district. Mr. Porter and his assistants will move to this city, and of course their pay roll will be transferred here, which amounts to about \$1,000 per month. Mr. H. E. Bruffey will continue to be train master, and Mr. E. C. Bodge chief dispatcher. No change will be made in the management of the South Rocky Mount terminal.—Twin City Echo.

FAIRFIELD NOTES.

The weather for corn gathering is fine and the farmers are making good use of the good weather. Mrs. Emma McKinney, wife of John McKinney, died this week in Garner, a nearby village. Fair crops and good prices have caused two new stores to open up at this place, Messrs. C. W. Carter and L. L. Rue being the two new merchants. Mr. W. L. Wilson, of Moyock, N.

C. was a visitor at this place recently. Stock peas are selling at \$1 per bushel and black peas for \$1.50 per bushel.

RECEIPTS FROM THE FOOTBALL GAME \$6,000.

Norfolk, Nov. 28.—While no official figures have been given out it is estimated that the receipts of yesterday's game of football between A. and M. and V. P. I. will reach \$6,000. The attendance was estimated conservatively at 8,000, and with the price of admission ranging from 50 cents to \$2, an average of 75 cents per head is regarded as a fair average. At this rate the total would be \$6,000, and with probably \$1,000 to be deducted for expenses, would leave a balance of \$5,000, to be divided among the two teams. This would give each management \$2,500, which is considered a good amount for one contest.
