TO YOUNG MEN OF THE SOUTH.

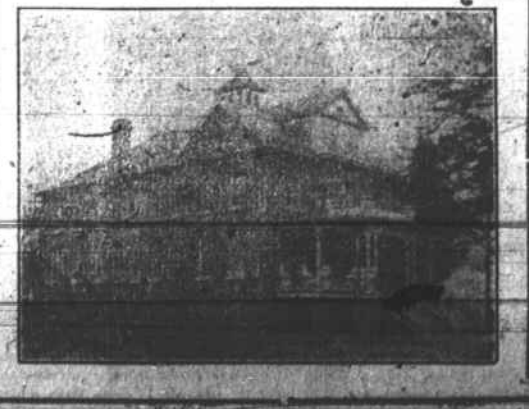
