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NOTICE OF REGISTRATION AND ORDER OF ELECTION FOR THE THOUSAND DOLLARS ROAD BONDS WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of 1912 passed an act to PROVIDE FOR THE WORKING OF PUBLIC ROADS ON VARIOUS TOWNSHIPS AND ISSUING BONDS FOR THE SAME;

And whereas a petition in writing signed by not less than one-fourth of the qualified voters of Washington Township has this day been presented to the Board of County Commissioners of Beaufort County, requesting said commissioners to submit to the qualified voters of Washington Township where said petitioners reside, a proposition to issue bonds for the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars, for the purpose of paying out, establishing, altering, repairing, grading, constructing and improving the public roads of Washington Township, and for purchasing machinery, tools, etc., necessary for such improvements, said bonds to run for a period not to exceed twenty-five years, and to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS FOR THE COUNTY OF BEAUFORT:—

1st: That on the 4th day of January, 1916, an election is hereby ordered to be held in the various polling places of Washington Township, Beaufort County, North Carolina, and at the said election there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said Township a proposition to issue coupon bonds for the purpose above recited in the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars, said bonds to run for a period not to exceed twenty-five years, and to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually and in denomination not less than One Hundred Dollars and not exceeding One Thousand Dollars each. 2nd: That at said election all those qualified to vote who are in favor of said proposition shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "FOR ROAD BONDS," and those opposed to the proposition shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "AGAINST ROAD BONDS," and said election shall be conducted in the same manner and subject to the same rules and regulations as are, or may be provided for the election of township officers by the election laws of North Carolina, unless in any manner otherwise provided for by Chapter 122 Public Laws of 1913.

3rd: That a new registration of voters is hereby ordered for said election in said township.

4th: That the registration books shall be opened on the 3rd day of December, 1915, and shall remain open for twenty days preceding the day of election, said registration books being closed on the 25th day of December, 1915.

5th: That the following persons are and they are hereby appointed Registrars and Judges of election in their respective precincts:

- First Ward, W. K. Jacobson. Second Ward, T. W. Phillips. Third Ward, W. W. Lewett. Fourth Ward, H. P. Davis. Tranters Creek, I. P. Hodges. Old Ford, Ben Bishop. Pineville, Jas. H. Corey.

6th: That this notice shall be posted at the Courthouse door and every polling place in Washington Township, and also be published once a week for four weeks in the Washington Daily News, this November 1st, 1915.
