15,000 OF 800,000 N.Y. SCHOOL CHILDREN HAVE HEART DISEASE

(By United Press) New York, Sept. 25.—Heart disease among school children here is becoming a serious menace to public health, according to figures available today in a report by the Health Department. Fifteen thousand of the 800,000 New York school children suffer today from it.

Infectious diseases, intoxication and improper methods of living are directly responsible, the department believes, adding that the rheumatic group of infectious diseases is the most prevalent cause. The department plans a campaign to check the progress of the disease among the children. The department's report also shows that 10,000 persons die from heart disease in New York every year.

NEW YORK SCHOOLS WILL OPEN TODAY

New York, Sept. 25.—Delayed since the regular opening date the first of the month, by the infantile paralysis epidemic which has claimed about 10,000 victims of whom 3,000 died; and which cost the city a million dollars, school opened here today.

A goodly percentage of New York city's boys and girls did not attend, however, because their parents still fear the disease which has baffled city, county, state and federal authorities until the last few weeks. It now is believed the blood infusion method has shown the way to the control of the disease. Every precaution will be taken to prevent a repetition of the epidemic next year.
