ARE WE BEING JUST?

Nearly all of our citizens spend a dollar or two a week for things that they could well afford to do without. And there are thousands of persons in Armenia and Syria who are starving for the want of food.

The condition of those people is terrible. The Mohatmedans are known the world over as a cold-blooded race but even they, when they saw the anguish and the suffering of those poor people could not bear the sight and wept openly.

Daily reports, received from Armenia, show that the conditions there are steadily growing worse. Entire families have been wiped out. In one town a man with eight children, the youngest of them a babe in arms, saw everyone of them die of starvation and saw his wife kill herself by her own hands because she could no longer bear to watch the torture of her little ones. Many similar cases have occurred. The world has never seen such misery and it is hoped that it will never see it again.

And we citizens of Beaufort county, living in peace and prosperity, do we not owe it to our God to help those sufferers and to give them a small portion of the plenty which He has bestowed upon us?

MONDAY NIGHT'S CELEBRATION.

Washington held a great demonstration Monday night in honor of Woodrow Wilson's re-election. The affair passed off in splendid style and was not marred by a single unpleasant incident.

Usually, in affairs of this kind, there is considerable "rough-house." The writer happens to have been in several other cities when celebrations of Monday night's style were carried out and in everyone of them, the police were kept busy in arresting disorderly and intoxicated persons. But in Washington, there was not the slightest disorder and if there was a drunken man in the city, he kept out of sight until after the celebration was over.

Citizens from every part of the country took part in Monday night's big event and both city and country people appeared to be determined to have a good time but at the same time conduct themselves so as to give no offense to anyone. They succeeded royally and they deserve unlimited praise and commendation.

One thing is certain, there has not been another city in North Carolina that has held a better or a more orderly celebration of any kind than that which was held here. We have a right to be proud of old Beaufort county and for her high type of citizenship.

ANTI-GERMAN SENTIMENT.

Yesterday's dispatches told of new indignities that were being worked upon the Belgian people by their German conquerors. Able-bodied men, according to the report, have been forced to leave homes and families and have been sent to Germany, there to work in industrial plants. The means of support has been deprived from thousands of families, who are now forced to undergo hardship and suffering.

It is acts of this kind that has caused the greater part of the anti-German sentiment in the United States. The heartless actions and deeds committed under the approval of the German government have turned countless thousands against Germany. And as long as Germany persists in playing the tyrant to countries that are unable to help themselves, just so long will this sentiment continue to be against her.

"D. Y. C. S. E."

Those letters have an all important meaning at this season of the year. They stand for "Do Your Christmas Shopping Early." It is a slogan which has been adopted all over the country during the last few years and it is a worthy one.

The season for Christmas shopping will soon be upon us. The clerks are beginning to dread the time when they will be forced to remain at work until the late hours of the night. They will be kept on the rush from early morning until the stores close. And their task can be made much easier for them if the people would only adopt the "D. Y. C. S. E." slogan.

The "early" does not refer alone to the calendar, but also to early in the day. Many persons put off their shopping trips until afternoon or evening. As a result, the clerks have comparatively nothing to do during the morning and are made to go the limit during the later hours of the day. This causes general dissatisfaction, not only to the clerks but to the customers, for when there is a big crowd in a store it is impossible to get the proper attention.

For your own benefit and for the benefit of everyone else, make up your mind to adopt the "Early" slogan and get it over with.

And, incidentally, we might say that the merchants of Washington are putting in the largest stock of Christmas goods that they have ever handled. There will be large assortments of gifts to select from and everybody should find their wants satisfied. Let's all join in making this Christmas a merry one for our home folks—instead of the merchants in some other city or the heads of the mail order houses.
